The order is not about granting permission (as would be found in a legal approval context) or facilitating negotiations, nor is it primarily focused on encouraging compliance—though it may indirectly promote compliance by enforcing the cessation of wrongful conduct. The defining characteristic of a cease-and-desist order is its directive to stop illegal acts, making that option the most relevant choice.
