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Explanations

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1. Which phase is associated with objective assessment of the effectiveness and impact of interventions?

A. Evaluation phase

B. Nursing process

Evaluation is the phase in the nursing process where outcomes are measured and the effectiveness and impact of interventions are judged using objective data. It involves determining whether the patient met the expected goals and whether the therapy produced the desired benefits or caused adverse effects. This relies on concrete, observable information such as vital signs, lab results, drug levels, symptom changes, and functional measures, rather than just subjective impressions. For example, after initiating an antihypertensive regimen, you'd review repeated blood pressure readings to see if targets are reached and whether the patient tolerates the medication without adverse effects. In infection management, you'd look for objective signs of improvement like reduced fever, normalized white blood cell count, and waning infection symptoms. If outcomes aren't achieved or new problems arise, the plan is reassessed and adjusted. The other phases focus on different activities: assessment is about gathering data to establish a baseline and monitor changes; planning involves setting measurable goals and selecting interventions; implementation is the process of carrying out those interventions.

Carrying out planned actions to address a patient problem is the implementation, or intervention, phase of the nursing process. Administering morphine sulfate IV to relieve incision pain is exactly putting the analgesia plan into effect, which is the intervention step. The nurse would have already assessed the patient's pain and developed a plan for analgesia, and after giving the medication would reassess pain to gauge effectiveness, which is how evaluation follows the intervention.

Deficient knowledge in this context means the patient lacks information needed to safely and effectively use a medication. It's not about whether the patient forgets a dose, refuses treatment, or can't afford it; it's about gaps in understanding the medication itself. This often shows up when starting a new prescription or when the patient hasn't received adequate education about the drug. The nurse should assess what the patient knows (purpose, dosing, timing, route, what to do if a dose is missed, potential side effects and interactions, storage) and identify gaps, then provide clear teaching and verify understanding.

Action in the nursing process is about putting everything into motion—the nurse uses knowledge, skills, and nursing care to carry out the plan and move toward the goal and optimal wellness. This is the implementation phase, where interventions are performed, medications are administered as ordered, patient responses are monitored, education is provided, and care is coordinated with other team members. The aim is to translate the planning into actual patient care and progress toward the desired outcomes. By contrast, assessment focuses on collecting data about the patient, planning involves setting goals and selecting specific interventions, and evaluation checks whether the goals were met and what adjustments are needed.

5. Define therapeutic index and explain its importance for monitoring during therapy.

Therapeutic index measures how safe a drug is by looking at the relationship between the dose that could cause toxicity and the dose that provides therapeutic benefit. It's usually expressed as the ratio TD_{50}/ED_{50} , meaning the toxic dose for 50% of people divided by the effective dose for 50% of people. A large ratio means a wide safety margin—the effective dose is far from the toxic dose, so dosing is more forgiving. A small or narrow ratio means a small gap between benefit and toxicity, so small changes in dose, patient factors (age, organ function), interactions with other drugs, or adherence can tip the balance toward harm or toward suboptimal effect. That's why drugs with a narrow therapeutic index require close monitoring during therapy, sometimes including therapeutic drug monitoring to keep drug levels within a safe and effective range and to adjust dosing promptly. Examples include medications like digoxin, lithium, theophylline, and warfarin, where clinicians pay careful attention to dosing and patient response. The other ways of describing TI don't capture this safety margin. Defining TI as a ratio of maximum to minimum dose across patients misses the toxicity/effectiveness relationship. Defining it as effective dose to toxic dose inverts the concept. Defining it as therapeutic dose to placebo dose introduces a comparison that isn't about safety margins at all.

Safe discharge planning for a patient who will live alone centers on making medication management simple and understandable. Providing a simplified regimen with clear dosing times and education supports independent use by reducing confusion, lowering the risk of missed or double doses, and boosting confidence in self-care. Using plain language, explicit times (for example, take at 8 am and 8 pm), and teach-back to confirm understanding helps ensure the patient can follow the plan correctly. Written materials or visual aids, along with guidance on what to do if a dose is missed and what side effects require attention, further enhance safety. This approach fosters safer self-management much more effectively than giving medications without instructions, arranging no follow-up or caregiver support, or leaving the patient unsupervised, all of which elevate the potential for errors and adverse events. In practice, tailor the regimen to the patient's daily routine, simplify where possible, and verify understanding to support safe functioning at home.

Noncompliance means the patient, after being properly educated about the therapy, decides not to take the prescribed medication. It is the act of not following the regimen by choice, highlighting patient autonomy. This term is often used interchangeably with nonadherence. It isn't only about forgetting doses or about financial barriers; those are contributing factors to nonadherence, but the definition here centers on a deliberate decision not to take the medication despite adequate education.

Aging brings several changes in the gastrointestinal system that affect how quickly and how much of an oral drug is absorbed. Gastric emptying tends to slow, so the drug spends more time in the stomach before reaching the small intestine where most absorption occurs. Gastric pH often rises with age, meaning less acidity, which can hinder the dissolution and absorption of drugs that rely on an acidic environment. Additionally, splanchnic blood flow to the GI tract decreases in older adults, slowing the transfer of absorbed drug into the bloodstream. Together, these factors delay absorption and can alter the onset and sometimes the extent of absorption. So, the description of slower gastric emptying, reduced gastric acidity, and decreased splanchnic blood flow delaying absorption best fits aging effects. The other scenarios—faster gastric emptying, increased acidity, or no change—do not align with common age-related GI changes.

Absorption is the process by which a drug moves from its site of administration across membranes into the circulating fluid, allowing entry into the bloodstream. This step determines how much of the drug reaches systemic circulation and how quickly, and it varies with the route (oral, topical, inhaled, or parenteral) as well as the drug's properties (lipid solubility, molecular size, and ionization) and the absorption site conditions. After absorption, distribution describes movement from blood to tissues, metabolism is the chemical alteration usually in the liver, and excretion is the elimination from the body.

Goals describe the desired patient outcomes in the nursing process. During planning, the nurse takes what was found in assessment to set specific, measurable, and time-bound targets the patient is expected to achieve. These goal statements provide the criteria for success and guide what care will be provided. They are patient-centered and realistic, and they drive the selection of interventions aimed at reaching them. For example, a goal might state that pain will be reduced to a specific level within a set timeframe, or that mobility will improve to a target range by a certain date. The plan of care encompasses these goals along with the chosen actions, while interventions are the concrete steps to reach them and assessment is the data collection that helps determine progress toward the goals.
