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Explanations

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1. Which department is responsible for water rights as a listed duty?

- A. Department of the Interior**
- B. Department of Agriculture**
- C. Department of Commerce**
- D. Department of Defense**

Water rights are a natural resource responsibility, tied to managing public lands and the country's water resources. The department that handles this is the Department of the Interior, because it oversees natural resources and manages water through its agencies like the Bureau of Reclamation and the U.S. Geological Survey. These agencies implement water allocation, develop and operate hydraulic projects, and administer water rights, including agreements with states and tribal communities. The other departments don't have water rights as a primary listed duty. The Department of Agriculture focuses on farming, forestry, and rural development, which involves water use for irrigation but not the overarching responsibility for water rights itself. The Department of Commerce concentrates on economic activity, trade, and industry, while the Department of Defense is about national security and military matters.

2. Which of the following is a correct expansion for GDP?

GDP stands for Gross Domestic Product, the total market value of all final goods and services produced within a country's borders in a given period. This label captures the idea that the output counted is produced domestically, and by focusing on final goods and services, it avoids double-counting intermediate products. Among the options, Gross Domestic Product is the correct expansion. The others aren't used terms in macroeconomics: Global Development Plan would describe a plan rather than a measurement; General Domestic Product isn't a standard term; and Gross Domestic Produce uses Produce instead of Product.

3. Which agency would you contact about environmental issues?

Understanding which agency handles environmental issues means recognizing the government body responsible for protecting air, water, land, and public health through regulations and enforcement. The Environmental Protection Agency is the primary federal agency dedicated to that mission, overseeing major environmental laws, setting standards for clean air and clean water, regulating hazardous waste and chemicals, and coordinating responses to environmental problems. The other agencies work in different areas—securities and markets for the SEC, space exploration for NASA, and communications regulation for the FCC—so they aren't the go-to for environmental concerns.

4. Which metric adjusts nominal GDP to account for price changes across the economy?

This question hinges on how to strip out price changes when looking at overall economic output. The GDP deflator is the price index that measures the average price of all final goods and services produced within a country's borders. Because it covers everything in GDP—consumption, investment, government spending, and net exports—it captures inflation or deflation across the entire economy, not just a fixed basket of consumer goods. That broad scope is why it's used to convert nominal GDP into real GDP. Real GDP shows how much of the change in GDP is due to changes in actual output, removing the effects of changing price levels. In formula terms, Real GDP equals Nominal GDP divided by the GDP deflator (with the deflator expressed as a decimal). Other options don't fit as well: a price level indicator can be any gauge of overall price levels and isn't a specific tool for converting nominal to real GDP; a cost-of-living index (like the CPI) measures consumer prices for a fixed basket and misses price changes in many other components of GDP; and the unemployment rate measures labor market conditions, not price changes.

Subsidized Stafford loans are federal loans where the government covers the interest during times when you're not required to pay it yourself—specifically while you're in school at least half-time, during grace periods, and during deferment. This means you don't pay interest while you're a student, and the government pays it for you. There's no cosigner required for these loans—the government is the lender. The other statements don't fit because interest isn't paid by you during school, these loans aren't limited to foreign students, and federal loans have fixed interest rates. The key idea is that the government covers the interest during qualifying periods, reducing your borrowing cost while you study.

6. Name the first artificial satellite launched by the Soviet Union in 1957.

- A. Sputnik 1**

This question tests your knowledge of the first artificial satellite launched by the Soviet Union and when it happened. Sputnik 1 earned its place in history on October 4, 1957, as the first human-made object placed into Earth orbit, signaling the start of the space age. Its simple metal-sphere design carried a radio beacon that transmitted signals back to Earth and allowed tracking of its orbit, which established that a satellite could reach and circle the planet. The other options don't fit because they represent later missions or different destinations. Sputnik 2 came after Sputnik 1 and carried a dog named Laika, but it wasn't the first satellite. Luna 1, launched in 1959, was a lunar probe intended to study the Moon, not an Earth-orbiting satellite. Venera 1, launched in 1961, was a probe to Venus. So Sputnik 1 is the correct pick because it is the earliest Soviet Earth-orbiting satellite in 1957.

7. Which function is described as a duty of the FDA in the material?

The main idea being tested is the FDA's role in protecting public health by ensuring food safety and safe ingredients. The FDA is responsible for overseeing the safety of the foods we eat, reviewing and approving food additives, inspecting production facilities, and enforcing labeling so consumers can trust what they're consuming. The other options point to responsibilities handled by different agencies: Social Security benefits come from the Social Security Administration, public housing programs are managed by housing authorities under HUD, and vaccine research is conducted by other research-focused entities (with the FDA mainly regulating and approving vaccines rather than conducting the research itself). So the function described—protecting our food and ensuring safe ingredients—best matches the FDA's duty.

8. In which year did India gain independence?

Independence refers to the moment Britain handed over political power to Indians after a long freedom movement. That happened in 1947, with the transfer of power and India's independence on August 15, 1947. The other years relate to other milestones: 1950 is when India became a republic; 1952 marks the first general elections; 1939 is before independence during the colonial era and the start of World War II. So 1947 is the year India gained independence.

9. In what year was the Department of the Interior established?

The year the Department of the Interior was established marks when Congress created a dedicated federal agency to handle internal affairs such as land management, natural resources, and relations with Native American tribes, rather than spreading those duties across multiple departments. This centralization was driven by the nation's westward expansion and the need for a unified approach to public lands and domestic governance. The department came into being in 1849, with the act signed into law that year, making it the formal start of its role in managing internal affairs. The other dates correspond to different historical events and don't reflect the establishment of this department.

10. Who wrote the tragedy Macbeth?

Macbeth is a tragedy written by William Shakespeare, the renowned English playwright of the Elizabethan and Jacobean eras. Written around 1606, the play follows Macbeth's ascent to power and his eventual downfall after the witches' prophecies, exploring themes of ambition, fate, guilt, and the corrupting influence of power. This makes William Shakespeare the correct answer. The other authors—Charles Dickens, Jane Austen, and George Orwell—are famous for different kinds of writing in other periods: Dickens for Victorian novels, Austen for early 19th-century romances and social commentary, and Orwell for 20th-century dystopias and political critiques—so none of them wrote Macbeth.
