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Explanations

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1. In probability, what is the likelihood of heads on a fair coin flip?

- A. $1/3$
- B. $1/2$**
- C. 1
- D. 0

A fair coin has two equally likely outcomes on each flip: heads and tails. The probability of heads is the number of favorable outcomes (heads) divided by the total number of possible outcomes (heads or tails), which is $1/2$. This means about half of many flips will come up heads in the long run. The other values don't fit: $1/3$ would require three equally likely outcomes, 1 would mean heads always occurs, and 0 would mean heads never occurs.

2. Who wrote The Republic?

Plato wrote *The Republic*. This ancient Greek dialogue, where Socrates is the central voice, is attributed to Plato, who was Socrates' student. The work uses the conversation to explore justice, the nature of the ideal city, and the role of the philosopher in ruling. Aristotle was Plato's student but did not author this dialogue and wrote his own separate works. Socrates, while a key figure in many of Plato's dialogues, is not the author. Confucius, a Chinese philosopher, produced different foundational texts, not this Greek dialogue.

3. What does the GDP deflator measure?

The GDP deflator measures the price level for all goods and services included in GDP, meaning everything produced domestically that goes into GDP—consumer goods, investment goods, government purchases, and net exports. It reflects how prices change across the entire economy's output, not just a fixed subset. You compute it by comparing nominal GDP to real GDP, so it rises whenever the overall price level for domestic production increases. This broad scope distinguishes it from the consumer price index, which tracks a fixed basket of consumer goods, and from stock-price indices or unemployment measures, which track entirely different concepts.

4. Which planet is known for the Great Red Spot?

The Great Red Spot is a clue about where you'd find this feature: it sits in Jupiter's atmosphere. Jupiter, a gas giant with a thick, layered atmosphere and no solid surface, spins very quickly. That rapid rotation, along with turbulent atmospheric dynamics, fuels enormous, long-lasting storms that create the planet's famous banded appearance. The Great Red Spot is gigantic—larger than Earth—and has persisted for centuries, a testament to how storms behave in a world without a solid ground to interrupt them. Other planets listed have storms or red tones, but they don't host this iconic feature: Saturn has its own storms and rings, Mars has dust storms on a rocky surface, and Mercury has very little atmosphere. So this persistent, iconic storm belongs to Jupiter.

Safety regulation focuses on protecting workers from hazards and ensuring workplaces meet established safety standards. The agency that embodies this is OSHA—the Occupational Safety and Health Administration. OSHA sets safety rules, conducts inspections, and enforces penalties to keep work environments safe, covering aspects like training, hazard communication, use of protective gear, and how injuries are recorded. This direct focus on preventing accidents and health risks is what makes OSHA the best fit for safety regulation. The other options relate to pay (minimum wage), health benefits (healthcare), or working hours, which are labor or benefits policies rather than specific safety standards.

6. Which gas is most abundant in Earth's atmosphere?

- A. Oxygen

Nitrogen is the most abundant gas in Earth's atmosphere because it is extremely stable and largely inert as N₂. This diatomic molecule doesn't readily react, so it tends to stay in the atmosphere and accumulate to high levels. The atmosphere is roughly 78% nitrogen by volume, with oxygen making up about 21%. The remaining gases—like argon and trace amounts of others—taddle along at well under 1%. Hydrogen is present only in trace amounts because it is light and tends to escape into space over time. So the gas you breathe the most is nitrogen.

7. Which statement about the Pell Grant is accurate?

Pell Grants are federal aid awarded to undergraduate students based on demonstrated financial need, as determined by the FAFSA, cost of attendance, and enrollment status. Because they are grants, they do not have to be repaid, unlike loans. They are not available to international students, and the amount awarded doesn't automatically cover all tuition—it's determined by need and other factors and often covers only a portion of costs. So, the statement that best describes the Pell Grant is that it is a need-based grant that does not need to be repaid.

8. Which domain is associated with the Air Force in the material?

- A. Air/cyber**
- B. Land
- C. Water
- D. Space

The domain associated with the Air Force in this material is air/cyber. This reflects how the Air Force operates primarily in the air domain, with cyber capabilities closely integrated alongside air operations to support missions such as communications, targeting, and command and control. The other options point to domains typically tied to other branches—land for ground forces, water for maritime forces, and space for space-focused forces—so the pairing shown in the material is air/cyber.

9. What does GDP stand for?

GDP stands for Gross Domestic Product. It measures the total market value of all final goods and services produced within a country's borders over a specific period. The word "gross" signals the total value before subtracting depreciation; "domestic" means the production occurs inside the country; "product" refers to the goods and services produced. This is different from Gross National Product, which focuses on the output of a country's residents regardless of where it's produced, and from Net Domestic Product, which subtracts depreciation from GDP. So the matching term is Gross Domestic Product.

10. What development is associated with the year 1953 in the material?

- A. Development of vaccines**
- B. Space exploration milestones**
- C. Civil rights advances**
- D. Digital computers progress**

This question is testing how to read a timeline in the material and connect a specific year to the development it highlights. In the material, 1953 is described as a milestone in vaccine development, signaling that vaccines are the development associated with that year. The other domains—space exploration, civil rights advances, and digital computer progress—are tied to different years or contexts in the text, so they don't match 1953 as described. So when you see 1953 linked with a public health achievement and immunization efforts, that signals vaccines as the development being referenced.
