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## **Explanations**

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**1. What big event happens on the first morning of Mary Day?**

- A. June says no to marrying Neil.

The moment being tested is June's decision about her future with Neil during Mary Day. The big event on that first morning is June saying yes to marrying Neil. Her affirmative response confirms their engagement and moves the relationship forward, making the wedding plans take shape. It isn't the moment of the proposal itself, nor a public engagement announcement—the decisive act is her acceptance.

**2. Who comes to help Lily in her struggle against T. Ray?**

Lily's safety and sense of belonging come from the care she receives from August Boatwright and Rosaleen. The other options don't fit as well because they imply motives like fear, assuming Lily doesn't want to know, or hoping Lily would never ask. None of those capture the tenderness and protective rationale behind Rosaleen's choice to avoid sharing painful details.

The idea being tested is how naming in legends reflects identity, hope, and resilience. This naming reclaims a religious image for a marginalized group, making the statue feel intimate and protective rather than distant or purely white. It shows how they rooted their faith in a figure who shared in their struggle, turning oppression into a source of strength.

This choice reflects her proactive search for facts rather than relying on memory or rumor. The other options describe actions that don't align with her goal of gathering concrete information about her mother.

The main idea is that social expectations around pregnancy at the time push adults to marry. Deborah Fontanel becomes pregnant with Lily, and in that setting marrying the father to provide a legitimate family and stability for the child was a common and practical response. This explains why their union began: it was about the baby and social norms, not about love or other motivations. The other options don't fit what the story shows about their relationship and circumstances.

**10. Where do Lily and Zach go to harvest honey?**

The main idea here is that honey comes from bees living in a hive, and harvesting takes place at that hive. Bees store honey inside the combs in the hive, and beekeepers work at the hive to collect it. So Lily and Zach go to the hive to harvest honey, because that is the place where bees live, produce, and store the honey. The other options describe broader places that aren't the specific site where honey is harvested; a farm might have hives, but the actual harvesting happens at the hive itself, while the country or city aren't related to the act.
