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## **Explanations**

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**1. After the incident in Sylvan, Lily Owens and Rosaleen flee to which town?**

- A. Sylvan, South Carolina**
- B. Charleston, South Carolina**
- C. Tiburon, South Carolina**
- D. Beaufort, South Carolina**

This question checks your recall of where Lily and Rosaleen head after the disruption in Sylvan. After the incident, they flee to Tiburon, South Carolina, a small coastal town that becomes their first refuge. Tiburon is where Lily and Rosaleen meet August Boatwright and the other sisters, which dramatically shifts the story from danger to a chance for healing and a new family. The other towns don't fit the plot progression: Sylvan is where the trouble starts, while Charleston and Beaufort aren't where they escape to in this part of the story.

Staying with August gives Lily a safe, supportive home where she's seen, valued, and mentored. August and the Boatwright sisters offer care, honest guidance, and a sense of belonging she hasn't found with her father. In that space, Lily can start to understand who she is, work through memories of her mother, and begin imagining a future beyond fear and running away. The bees, the rhythms of the honey house, and the sisters' warmth provide structure and purpose, helping her move forward rather than retreat or remain isolated.

This question centers on Lily recognizing her hidden bias and what prompts that realization. The moment that stands out is when she sees the intelligence, dignity, and depth of Black people through her time with the Boatwright sisters and Rosaleen. Lily has grown up with stereotypes about Black people, but the people she meets in the boatyard—who think clearly, share wisdom, and contribute meaningfully to conversations and plans—show her that Black individuals can be intelligent and capable. This confrontation with real, accomplished people forces her to question the blanket assumption she was raised with and to reassess what she has believed about race. While Lily's broader growth includes recognizing equality and acknowledging that she herself can be prejudiced, the strongest description of this particular turning point is the realization that Black people could be intelligent. The other options describe related shifts, but they don't pinpoint the specific moment of overturning her stereotype about intelligence.

The key idea this question tests is how racial tensions and segregation shape what characters reveal and how the community reacts. The news Zach brings—about a famous visitor coming to Tiburon and planning to bring a black woman to sit in the white section of the movies—directly exposes the town's racial boundaries and the stubborn prejudice that maintains them. In the setting of a shared lunch feast, this kind of announcement becomes a spark that exposes hypocrisy, fear, and the potential for change. It shows how a public, seemingly glamorous moment can clash with openly racist norms, forcing characters to confront what they've long avoided. The other kinds of news—about a town festival, a new theater technician, or a planned debate about cinema seating—wouldn't hit the same nerve. They're more routine or neutral and don't foreground the charged issue of racial segregation the way this particular announcement does, so they don't illuminate the social dynamics in the same revealing way.

April is described as May's twin sister, and her death by suicide is a significant backstory in the story. This loss helps explain May's intense emotional nature and the fragile atmosphere in the Boatwright household. Knowing that April existed as May's twin and that she died by suicide gives insight into why May carries such grief and why the sisters' bond—and the family's coping with tragedy—matters so much to Lily's understanding of the world around them. The other described roles don't match what the text presents about April, so the detail that she was May's twin who died by suicide is the one that fits the story.

The closing image centers on Becca with her mothers, underscoring the story's focus on family and the safety of nurturing relationships. Throughout *The Secret Life of Bees*, maternal figures and the sense of belonging they provide are a core source of strength for the characters. Seeing Becca with her mothers in the final moment visually reinforces that theme—that care, love, and stability come from that family bond. This moment isn't about Lily, or the bees themselves, or Zach. Those elements are present in other contexts, but the last scene specifically highlights Becca's connection to her mothers as the message of belonging and support.

The prose uses vivid sensory details—the textures, smells, and colors of the world around Lily—along with motifs like bees, honey, and womanly kinship to deepen themes of belonging, identity, and community. This intimate, poetic narration creates an emotional connection and meaning that would be missing if the perspective were distant, minimalist, or omniscient, or if the tone relied on irony or satire.

**8. Why does Lily leave the honey house while everyone seems to be meditating with Our Lady in Chains?**

The main idea is how Lily reacts to powerful symbols and what they reveal about her inner state. Our Lady in Chains represents suffering, captivity, and the tough realities women carry. Seeing Mary bound in chains makes her confront painful memories and her own sense of being trapped or limited, so she steps outside to breathe and process rather than stay with the meditation. That moment shows her sensitivity to oppression and her need to find her own space to reconcile those emotions. The other options aren't what that moment signals. It isn't about wanting a rest, fearing the bees, or needing a drink—the scene centers on Lily's discomfort with the chained Mary and her choice to leave because of it.

**9. From which state is Deborah?**

- A. California**

Deborah's background is given through Lily's family history and the notes the story ties to Deb's past, which point to Virginia as her home state. The narrative presents Deborah as a Virginia native, linking her origins to that place rather than to California, Texas, or New York. Recognizing where Deborah comes from helps readers understand Lily's sense of family heritage and how that history contrasts with the setting in Tiburon, South Carolina. The other states aren't connected to Deborah in the text, so Virginia is the best-supported choice.

**10. What happens to May when she finds out about Zach's being arrested?**

- A. She goes out to the park.**
- B. She writes another letter.**

May reacts to disturbing news by retreating to a private, comforting space where she can process her emotions. When she hears that Zach has been arrested, the weight of the moment pushes her to go out to the wall, a place she uses as a quiet refuge to sit with her fear and sadness. This choice shows her tendency to cope by seeking solitude and a familiar cradling environment rather than outward action. The other options don't align with how she handles crisis in this moment; she isn't seeking the park, drafting a letter, or hiding away.
