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Explanations

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1. Who is Rosaleen?

- A. Lily's mother
- B. Lily's nanny**
- C. Lily's teacher
- D. A neighbor

Rosaleen serves as Lily Owens's caregiver and maternal figure. She looks after Lily at home, provides guidance and protection, and is a trusted presence in Lily's life in the absence of Lily's mother. That nurturing, day-to-day caregiving role is why she's described as Lily's nanny. She isn't Lily's mother, a teacher, or merely a neighbor, but the person who cares for Lily like a family member.

2. Where does Lily live?

- A. In a foster home
- B. With her father**
- C. With Deborah
- D. With Rosaleen

Lily lives with her father. The story starts with Lily in the care of T. Ray, at their home in South Carolina, after her mother Deborah has died. Rosaleen helps around the house and serves as a maternal figure, but Lily's permanent home is with her father, not with Deborah or with Rosaleen. The foster-home option would imply a formal guardian different from her own father, and Deborah isn't alive to be a living guardian, so those choices don't fit Lily's actual living situation.

In a moment of sudden danger, the speaker uses a sharp, controlling command to calm the scene and assert power. The line "Hush!" is the best fit because it's brief, urgent, and designed to stop noise immediately without inviting further action or explanation. It mirrors a domineering attitude—someone who wants silence right away to maintain control as violence occurs. The other options would come off as milder or as calls for help or intervention, which doesn't match the tense, silencing impulse of the moment. So, the exact one-word exclamation best conveys the immediate need to quiet Lily's scream and assert control in the face of aggression.

4. Why did Deborah marry T. Ray?

- A. He owed her debt

The situation hinges on a pregnancy driving a marriage. In the story, Deborah marries T. Ray because she is pregnant with Lily, and at that time/within that community, becoming a mother outside of wedlock created strong social pressure to formalize the relationship through marriage. The decision isn't about love or debt or a plan to escape trouble; it's about providing a father and some stability for Lily while navigating difficult circumstances.

5. Becca goes to school with which character?

Becca's daily life in the story is defined by the people she goes to school with. Lily is the character described as Becca's schoolmate, sharing the school day with Becca and representing her peer group in that setting. The other options fit in different parts of the world the story builds: Zach is part of Lily's wider circle and town life, but not described as Becca's schoolmate; May and August are adult Boatwright sisters who aren't part of Becca's school environment. So recognizing that Becca and Lily attend the same school explains why Lily is the best answer.

6. In what year and location is the majority of the narrative set?

Time and place shape Lily's experiences in the story. Most of the action happens in 1964 in Tiburon, a small town in South Carolina, where Lily runs away and finds refuge with August, June, and May Boatwright, and where the honey farm and the sisters' world become the center of her life. Setting it in 1964 places the Civil Rights era squarely in the backdrop, influencing how people interact and what the characters confront. The other options don't fit because the story doesn't primarily take place in Savannah or Charleston, and a different year (1965) would shift the timeline and context. So, the best fit is 1964, Tiburon, South Carolina.

7. How does Lily feel about Rosaleen's moving to May's room?

A. She's upset, feels like Rosaleen is leaving her

B. She's excited Rosaleen is moving

The main idea being tested is Lily's sense of security and attachment to the adult figures who care for her. When Rosaleen moves into May's room, Lily interprets it as Rosaleen pulling away or choosing someone else over her, which taps into her deep-seated fear of abandonment since she has already lost her mother and relies on Rosaleen for protection and closeness. This change in daily living space signals a shift in the relationship dynamic, stirring feelings of sadness, worry, and insecurity rather than excitement. So the best description of Lily's reaction is that she's upset and feels like Rosaleen is leaving her. This moment helps show Lily's emotional vulnerability and how changes in care and companionship impact her deeply. The alternate responses don't fit because they imply happiness or indifference, which contradict Lily's protective, anxious response to what feels like a separation.

8. Who decides to marry Neil?

A. Lily.

B. Zach.

C. June.

This question tests how June's romantic arc develops and resolves. June, one of the Boatwright sisters, grows into a place where she's ready to commit to a future with someone who respects her and shares her life. Neil is that steady, caring partner, and June's decision to marry him shows her openness to love again and her belief in building a lasting partnership after the emotional upheavals in the story. This moment highlights themes of healing, resilience, and community support that run through the book. Lily's storyline centers on her feelings for Zach, not Neil, and August's path involves different concerns and not a marriage to Neil, so June's decision is the distinct choice tied to her character.

9. Who comes to help Lily in her struggle against T. Ray?

A. Mary's daughter, August and Rosaleen.

B. August alone.

C. The police and a judge.

D. Deborah and Lily's aunt.

Lily's safety and sense of belonging come from the care she receives from August Boatwright and Rosaleen. August, who is Mary's daughter, offers Lily a home and guidance, teaching her about bees and helping her imagine a life beyond T. Ray's control. Rosaleen stays by Lily's side, providing friendship and protection as they adjust to this new world. Their combined support gives Lily the shelter, trust, and hope she's been missing, which is why this duo is the best answer. The police and a judge don't arrive to intervene at this moment, and Deborah or Lily's aunt aren't the ones who step in with the needed care.

10. What is August's stance on truth-telling and forgiveness?

- A. She values silence and retaliation.
- B. She discourages truth-telling.
- C. She advocates harsh truth-telling without forgiveness.
- D. She urges telling the truth with kindness and choosing forgiveness for healing.**

August's stance centers on honesty tempered by compassion, and forgiveness as a route to healing. She believes you should speak the truth in a way that respects others and promotes understanding, not to wound or humiliate. At the same time, she sees forgiveness as essential to move past hurt and to restore peace within the community. So telling the truth with kindness and choosing forgiveness for healing captures how she guides Lily to handle difficult truths while nurturing mercy and growth. The other options misalign with this approach: hiding the truth or retaliating contradicts her emphasis on honest, compassionate communication; or asserting harsh truth-telling without forgiveness ignores the healing power she associates with forgiving and letting go.
