## **Explanations**

**1. In *The Sherlock Society*, what is special about the island in the clue?**

- A. It can be reached without a boat and is an island on an island**
- B. It is reached only by ferry and is on a waterlogged map**

The idea being tested is how to read a clue that plays with geography and travel: an island that you can reach without using a boat, and that sits on top of another island. When a clue says an island is “an island on an island,” it points to a smaller land area that is itself surrounded by water, but located on a larger landmass that is also an island—so you can get there by moving over land on the bigger island rather than crossing water. That’s why the best choice is the one describing both conditions together: no boat needed to reach it, and the notion of an island perched on another island. The other options clash with this: needing a ferry means you do cross water, being on a different continent breaks the idea of being on an island within another landmass, and having no water around it would make it not an island at all.

**2. What does Virginia Jackson say she will donate her share to if they find the treasure?**

- A. The Literacy Program at the Miami-Dade Public Library**
- B. The Public Library**

The key idea is spotting the exact beneficiary named by the character. In the passage, Virginia says she will donate her share to a specific program: the Literacy Program at the Miami-Dade Public Library. That precise combination—“Literacy Program” plus a named institution—is what makes this option correct. It isn’t just donating to a general entity like “the Public Library,” nor to a broader or unrelated recipient like “a Literacy Charity” or “the Local Museum.” The text specifies that exact program and library, so recognizing the precise phrasing and proper nouns is essential. When questions ask what someone will donate to, look for the exact named program or institution that follows the donation, not a vague or generic description.

**3. What does Yadi call members of the Sherlock Society who do not believe his conspiracy theories?**

- A. Sheep**
- B. Fox**
- C. Heron**
- D. Badger**

This question hinges on a common metaphor used to dismiss people who doubt or resist a conspiracy: calling them a sheep. When Yadi uses that term, he's signaling that those who don't believe his theories aren't thinking for themselves; they're following the crowd without question. It emphasizes a divide between the supposed 'in-group' who buys into his narrative and the rest who are portrayed as blindly compliant with everyone else's beliefs. The word works especially well in a conspiracy setting because it suggests manipulation by leaders and a lack of independent judgment, which is exactly the dynamic such stories want to highlight. Other animal labels wouldn't carry the same people-are-following-the-crowd meaning. Fox implies slyness, not blind conformity; a heron or badger evokes different traits and doesn't convey the herd mentality Yadi aims to critique. So the term that best captures the intended insult and social dynamic is the one that labels skeptics as sheep.

Recall of the exact rental-home name used in the Keys storyline. This makes Banyan Lodge the correct choice because it matches the story's text exactly; the other names, while they might sound realistic, do not appear in the Keys storyline, so they would not fit the reference. A quick trick is to picture a lodge tucked beneath a banyan tree in the Keys, which reinforces the exact name.

**5. How long did the group search before deciding to give up?**

The main idea here is identifying the exact amount of time the group spent searching as stated in the story. The passage specifies that they looked for five days before deciding to give up, so five days is the duration that fits the narrative precisely. Shorter options like three or two days would imply the search ended sooner than described, and a week would be seven days, which isn't what was stated. Since the text provides a clear five-day timeframe, that matches what happened.

## 6. What did Al Capone bury in South Florida?

The idea being tested is folklore versus fact about a famous criminal. The most enduring version of Al Capone's legend in South Florida is that he hid a large cash stash there. The best answer reflects that widely circulated tale: a million dollars. This aligns with the common story of Capone hoarding cash during Prohibition and trying to keep it out of sight from authorities, which is why people talk about a hidden fortune in Florida. People often search for Capone's money, and while many legends exist, there's no credible evidence of a map, a gun, or a treasure chest being buried there. The notion of a million dollars fits the folklore pattern better—a concrete, substantial sum that would attract real-world searches and capture the imagination—whereas the other items aren't the centerpiece of the same well-known story.

## 7. In the book *The Sherlock Society*, what term did Tom Jackson prefer over gardener?

Labeling someone who works with plants reveals how authors convey skill and social standing through terminology. Tom Jackson's preference for calling a person who tends plants a plantsman carries a sense of cultivated knowledge, taste, and broader involvement with plant collection and design, not just routine upkeep. Gardener suggests plain, hands-on work focused on keeping things growing, but it doesn't imply expert breadth. Horticulturist and botanist point to scientific roles—study and classification—rather than practical cultivation or connoisseurship. Grower is too generic to carry the refined implication that plantsman does. So, choosing plantsman signals a respected, artful, and knowledgeable approach to plants, which fits the character's voice and the tone the author wants to convey.

**8. Which term did Carver students use for the cafeteria due to the language program?**

- A. The International Cafe**
- B. The Global Café**

- D. The Worldly Snack Bar**

The idea here is how a school's naming of a space mirrors the activity or focus of a program, in this case a language program shaping the cafeteria's identity. The term **The International Cafe** fits best because it directly signals a space that welcomes multiple languages and cultures, inviting students to connect, practice languages, and share experiences in a casual dining setting. The other options are less fitting. **Global Café** is similar in tone but doesn't as clearly tie the space to a language program or the idea of student language practice. **Language Lab Café** implies a more academic, study-focused environment rather than a social dining area. **Worldly Snack Bar** sounds informal and vague, lacking the clear link to language learning that the chosen name conveys.

**9. What did Alex discover when they reached the location of Al Capone's house?**

- A. It had been torn down**
- B. It was still standing**
- C. It became a museum**
- D. It was flooded**

The main idea here is that physical traces of historic places can disappear over time due to demolition or redevelopment. When Alex reached the location of Al Capone's house, there was no house to see because it had already been torn down years earlier. This shows how a site can lose its original feature and change completely, even if the place is famous in history. That's why the situation doesn't fit with the house still standing, becoming a museum, or being flooded. The story hinges on the fact that the building no longer existed at the site.

**10. In *The Sherlock Society*, what did Dad do to his hair as a way of rebelling when his parents divorced?**

When someone uses their appearance to signal a new, defiant stance after a family upheaval, a bold, dramatic hairstyle often does the most communicating. A Mohawk is a classic emblem of nonconformity and rebelliousness, so choosing it to reflect Dad's reaction to his parents' divorce makes sense: it's unmistakably attention-grabbing and declares a break from what's expected. Dyeing hair blue could show nonconformity, but it's more about color than a strong statement of identity. Cutting it short tends to imply practicality or neatness rather than rebellion. Wearing a hat all the time hides hair rather than making a statement, so it doesn't convey a rebellious mood in the same way.
