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Explanations

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1. Which term means 'anointed one' in Greek?

- A. Savior from suffering and oppression
- B. Messiah
- C. Anointed One**
- D. Prophet

The Greek term for "anointed one" is reflected in the title Christos, which becomes Christ in English. Therefore, the best-fitting choice is the one that translates directly to the meaning of Christos: Anointed One. Messiah is the Hebrew equivalent of the same idea, not the Greek form. The other terms describe related roles or concepts but do not capture the precise Greek meaning of Christos. So, Anointed One is the direct Greek meaning of the term in question.

2. The Road to Emmaus appearance occurs in which gospel?

The Road to Emmaus appearance is described in Luke's Gospel (Luke 24:13-35). In this account, two disciples travel from Jerusalem to Emmaus on the day of Jesus' resurrection, and they encounter Jesus along the road. He explains how Scripture foretells that the Messiah would suffer, die, and rise, and their recognition comes when he breaks bread with them. The scene highlights Luke's themes of Jesus' presence with believers, the importance of interpreting Scripture correctly, and the moment of recognition in shared meal fellowship. Other gospels recount resurrection appearances, but not this specific road narration. Mark focuses on the tomb and later appearances, Matthew on an appearance in Galilee to the disciples, and John on several separate post-resurrection appearances. Because the Road to Emmaus episode is unique to Luke, Luke is the correct source for this particular appearance.

Parables teach through short, relatable stories drawn from everyday life to reveal deeper spiritual truths about God and human response. This makes a simple story used to illustrate a lesson the best fit, because the purpose is to prompt reflection and guide how people should think or act before God. In the life and teaching of Jesus, parables illuminate the operations of the kingdom of God—mercy, forgiveness, faith—by placing characters in ordinary situations and then inviting a judgment or decision. They aren't legal codes with fixed rules, nor poetry focused on form, nor rituals performed as rites. The power of a parable lies in its narrative and the lesson it invites listeners to apply.

4. How did Jesus address hypocrisy and religious legalism?

The main idea is that Jesus challenged hypocrisy by redefining righteousness as obedience that reflects both what the commandments say and why they exist—their intended purpose of loving God and neighbor. He upheld the law's demands, but he rejected empty externalism that focuses on appearances while ignoring inner motives. In his teaching, outward rules are important, yet they must align with a transformed heart. This shows up in how he from the Sermon on the Mount moves from "you have heard it said" to "but I say to you," elevating intent alongside action. He points out that anger equates to murder and lust to adultery, and he urges practices like charity, prayer, and fasting to be done sincerely rather than for show. He also rebukes the Pharisees for meticulous tithing and ritual purity while neglecting justice, mercy, and faithfulness, making clear that the law's true aim is love in action. So the best answer is that Jesus taught to follow both the letter and the spirit of the law—preserving the outward standard while pursuing the heart's genuine obedience to God's purposes. He did not reject the law, he did not advocate focusing only on the letter, and he did not advocate adding more rules.

5. Who betrayed Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane?

Judas Iscariot is the one who betrayed Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane. In the scene, Jesus is praying while the disciples struggle to stay awake. Judas arrives with a crowd sent by the chief priests and elders, and he signals which person Jesus is by giving him a kiss. That kiss acts as the signal to arrest Jesus, marking Judas's act of betrayal—handing Jesus over to be seized. The other disciples do not betray Jesus in this moment; Peter, for example, later denies Jesus, and John and James are present but do not betray. Thus, the betrayal in the Garden is Judas Iscariot's.

The event hinges on recognizing who took the initiative to obtain Jesus' body for proper burial. Joseph of Arimathea, a respected member of the Jewish council who was secretly following Jesus, went to Pilate and requested Jesus' body so it could be buried. Pilate granted the request, and Joseph prepared the body by wrapping it in clean linen with spices and laying it in his own new tomb. Nicodemus assists with the burial by bringing spices and helping with the wrapping, but it is Joseph who initiates the request to release the body. Mary Magdalene and the other Mary later observe the tomb, but they are witnesses rather than the one who requested the body.

The person who asked for Jesus' body and provided burial is Joseph of Arimathea. He was a wealthy Jewish man from Jerusalem and a member of the Jewish council who, after Jesus' death, bravely went to Pilate to request the body. He then placed Jesus in his own unused tomb, preparing Him with a proper burial according to Jewish customs. This act shows both reverence for Jesus and a willingness to identify with Him publicly, even though it could bring political or social risk. That detailed action—asking for the body and providing a burial in a new tomb he owned—fits the described figure precisely. The other descriptions do not match the specific event of retrieving the body and giving it a respectful burial.

Gentile describes a non-Jewish person. In biblical and historical usage, this term marks someone who is not part of the Jewish people or covenant. A Roman citizen refers to a civil status or nationality, which isn't about religious or ethnic identity. A priest is a religious role within Judaism, not the label for non-Jews. So Gentile is the broad label for people who are not Jewish, and in the New Testament era it also highlights non-Jewish believers who joined the church.

9. Which is a nature miracle performed by Jesus?

Nature miracles reveal Jesus' authority over the physical world. Walking on water is a prime example because it shows him moving across the sea in a way that defies natural law, signaling divine power at work in creation. In the narrative, he approaches the disciples during a storm, demonstrates mastery over the elements, and reassures them with his presence. This stands apart from miracles of healing, exorcism, or forgiving sins, which address illness, spiritual oppression, or moral forgiveness rather than a direct display of command over nature.

10. How many days did Jesus fast in the wilderness, according to the record?

The main idea being tested is recalling the duration of Jesus' wilderness fast as described in the gospel accounts. The record presents this time in the wilderness as a sustained, uninterrupted fast that serves as a period of testing and reliance on God, not a short stint. Choosing the option that describes a long fasting period best fits the biblical narrative, because the text emphasizes a complete, extended duration rather than brief days. The other options imply shorter intervals, which don't align with how the wilderness experience is portrayed in the record. This prolonged fasting also underscores the seriousness of the preparation for Jesus' ministry and the spiritual depth of that moment.
