SAMPLE

1. What steps are involved in medical screening of arrestees prior to transport?

- A. Visual assessment, vital signs, medical history, current medications, allergies, injuries, pregnancy status, need for medical clearance, and documentation.

Medical screening before transport is about quickly and thoroughly assessing an arrestee's health to keep them safe during movement and to prepare for the receiving facility. The process includes several real-world steps that together give a complete picture of current needs and risks. Start with a quick visual assessment to note obvious injuries, signs of distress, intoxication, withdrawal, or other urgent concerns. Then check vital signs—pulse, breathing, blood pressure, and temperature—to identify instability that might require urgent care, ongoing monitoring, or a different transport plan. Gather medical history and current medications, and ask about allergies, chronic conditions, recent illnesses, and any ongoing treatments. Identify injuries that need stabilization or special handling during transport. Determine pregnancy status when relevant, since it affects monitoring, medications, and destination care. Assess whether medical clearance is required before moving the person to ensure the destination facility can provide appropriate care. Finally, document all findings clearly so the information travels with the arrestee to the next step of care and supports a proper handoff. This comprehensive approach reduces risk, guides care during transport, and supports accountability and continuity of care. Relying on only a visual check can miss critical issues; saying screening isn't necessary ignores safety; and doing screening after transport defeats the purpose of ensuring safe movement and custody care.

2. When should a search incident to arrest occur?

A search incident to arrest should occur at or immediately after the moment of arrest, in close proximity to the time and place of arrest, and within the arrestee's immediate control. This timing is essential to protect officer safety and prevent destruction of evidence, since the arrestee could reach for weapons or conceal/remove items during the initial moments of custody. If a search happens before arrest there's no custodial basis yet, and searches conducted later (such as after booking or during interrogation) rely on different authorities or procedures rather than the incident-to-arrest rule.

3. What is required before a federal inmate can be confined in a North Carolina jail?

The key idea is that federal detainees are received into a local jail under formal authorization from the U.S. Marshals Service. A written custody order from the U.S. Marshal is the official document that authorizes and directs the local jail to receive, hold, and transfer the federal inmate under the Marshal's supervision. This ensures there is clear legal authority for confinement and accountability for the inmate while in a state facility. Other options aren't how federal confinement is authorized: a letter from the Attorney General, a state waiver, or a police permit aren't the procedures that grant custody of a federal inmate to a NC jail.

4. Which element is essential when documenting any use of force during transport?

Documenting any use of force during transport must be objective and precise, with a timestamped description that clearly lays out what happened. This kind of record should detail the actions taken by officers, the arrestee's responses, any injuries observed or medical care provided, who witnessed the incident, and how evidence and devices used are preserved for potential review. The timestamped, factual narrative ensures the record is verifiable and can be relied upon in investigations, internal reviews, or legal proceedings. It also helps ensure accountability, transparency, and compliance with policy, by showing de-escalation attempts, control methods used, and steps taken to secure the scene and preserve relevant evidence. Relying on subjective opinions or only medical history misses the full context of the incident and can introduce bias or speculation. A narrative that reports outcomes without detailing how they occurred or what led to them lacks the necessary context to assess justification or legality. Including only medical history doesn't capture the actions, sequence, or witnesses that are essential to understanding the use-of-force event.

5. What best describes restraint policy differences for juveniles versus adults?

Restraint practices are designed to be applied uniformly to all arrestees, regardless of age, with safety, risk assessment, and the principle of using the least restrictive option guiding every decision. In this framework, the restraint policy itself remains the same for juveniles and adults, and staff are trained to apply consistent standards, monitor continuously, and document actions consistently across both groups. While there may be separate procedures around privacy, supervision, and handling of juveniles, the core policy on restraints isn't age-based. Statements suggesting juveniles require less restrictive handling, adults must always be group-handled, or juveniles require more restrictive restraints don't align with this uniform, risk-based approach.

When someone shows impairment symptoms, safety hinges on a careful, guided response rather than assumptions. The best approach is to assess how impaired they are, determine if medical clearance is needed, adjust the transport plan and monitoring accordingly, and coordinate with medical staff. This creates a safety net: you're not assuming they're fine, you're checking for medical issues or intoxication that could worsen during transport, and you're arranging appropriate care and supervision. If impairment is evident or a medical condition is suspected, getting medical clearance and tailoring the transport plan helps manage risks, ensures proper observation, and involves professionals who can direct the level of supervision and needed equipment. Releasing or transporting as if unimpaired ignores potential medical or behavioral risks, and ignoring impairment can put the individual and the team in danger.

7. Officers cannot use restraints on a juvenile under how many years old without a pending delinquency charge?

Age-based limits govern how restraints are used with juveniles during transport. The rule protects very young children from unnecessary restraint and requires adherence to developmentally appropriate handling. Specifically, you cannot place restraints on a juvenile younger than ten years old unless there is a pending delinquency charge. That makes ten years old the threshold: if the child is under ten and there's no pending charge, restraints should not be used. If there is a pending charge, restraints may be permitted according to policy.

8. When should officers search the transport vehicle?

Safety during transport relies on checking the vehicle between occupants. By searching after each arrestee or occupant, officers ensure that any weapon, contraband, or item left behind is found and secured before the next person is placed in the vehicle. This reduces risk to officers and other arrestees and helps maintain a clear chain of custody for items found. Searching before transport can miss items that the person might have hidden or left, and relying on consent isn't the standard safety practice. Never searching is unsafe and generally not policy.

9. Under which circumstances may an adult be photographed and have fingerprints taken for law enforcement records?

Booking happens when someone is arrested or taken into custody. At intake, officers or jail staff photograph the person (a mugshot) and take fingerprints as part of creating and updating the official records. This helps establish identity, document the arrest, and keep accurate records for court proceedings and custody management. So the circumstances that allow photographing and fingerprinting are specifically during arrest or when the person is being held in a detention facility. Once a person is released on bail, or after they've completed a sentence or probation, there isn't a routine booking process unless a new arrest occurs.

10. What does continuous observation mean, and when is it required during transport?

A. Continuous observation means an officer maintains visual contact at all times; required for high-risk individuals or policy-designated custody level

Continuous observation means keeping the arrestee in direct visual contact at all times during transport. The transporting officer must see the person throughout the trip, so there is immediate awareness of their behavior, condition, and any changes in risk or compliance. This level of supervision is required for individuals deemed high risk or when the custody level policy designates it. It helps prevent escapes or tampering with restraints, and it allows quick response if the arrestee appears agitated, self-harming, or needs medical attention. Monitoring from a separate vehicle or relying on CCTV does not provide the necessary real-time, direct supervision, and being optional contradicts the policy for high-risk or designated custody levels.
