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Explanations

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1. Which event motivates Mattie Ross to seek revenge?

- A. The murder of her mother by Tom Chaney
- B. The murder of her father by Tom Chaney**

Mattie Ross is driven to seek revenge by the murder of her father, Frank Ross, at the hands of Tom Chaney. That killing is the pivotal moment that sets her on a quest for Chaney, shaping her courage, determination, and sense of justice as she joins forces with a tough marshal to track him down. The other events listed don't occur as the motivating incident in the story, so they don't explain why she pursues Chaney.

2. Where did the Pepper gang force the train to the cattle siding?

- A. McAlester

The key moment is identifying the specific spot where the train is diverted off the main line into a cattle siding. Wagoner's Switch is a railroad switch point where trains can be routed onto a siding used for cattle or other cargo. In the scene, the Pepper gang forces the train to pull into that siding, making it easier to carry out their plan and escape afterward. The other places listed aren't described as the cattle siding in this event, so they don't fit the scene as it's depicted.

3. Which two pursuers form an early alliance with Mattie?

Cogburn brings toughness and fearlessness, LaBoeuf contributes skill and a more measured approach, and Mattie's fierce determination keeps the mission focused. This trio forms the early alliance that drives the pursuit forward. The other options don't fit because Captain Bell isn't part of the initial pursuit duo, and pairing LaBoeuf with Mattie without Cogburn misses the two pursuers who team up with her.

During the Katy robbery, the outlaws blow open the express car door with dynamite, and the express clerk inside is killed by the blast. That moment shows how dangerous and brutal the raid is, and it explains why the clerk doesn't escape or cooperate with the criminals. The other possibilities don't fit what happens in this scene—there's no escape, no joining the robbers, and no ransom negotiation by the clerk.

The setting's description and what it conveys about frontier life. Fort Smith is painted as a rugged, remote outpost rather than a bustling city, using mountain scenery and wintry imagery to create a harsh, isolated atmosphere. That portrayal—a mountainous, austere place with persistent winter mood—best captures the feel of a frontier town and why the description fits Fort Smith in the story.

Breaking out of the Fort Smith jail is a key plot moment that shows how quickly control can slip in a rough frontier town and why the pursuit of outlaws keeps going. This breakout underscores the unstable line between law and lawlessness in the setting and pushes the tension forward for Rooster Cogburn as he continues the chase. The other names are tied to different roles in the scene—someone who runs the jail, the pursuing marshal, and the outlaw leader—so they aren't the one who escapes in this moment.

The idea being tested is recognizing when a character shares a personal view rather than providing hard facts. That focus on his subjective assessment is why this choice is the best: it shows his attitude toward the marshals, not just neutral information. The other possibilities would require factual details like their names, a warning, or explicit praise, which isn't what the scene emphasizes here.

8. Which statement best describes how the film's pacing and humor compare to the novel's?

Focusing on how films adapt pacing and humor helps explain why the movie version feels different from the book. The film shifts to a faster tempo and sharper humor, using cinematic techniques to keep the story moving—quick scene transitions, more action-driven sequences, and a score that intensifies tension. The book, by contrast, unfolds at a steadier, more reflective pace, with humor that grows out of Portis's distinctive narrator voice and the episodic travelogue of the characters. So the film's approach—darker humor, heightened action, and a more cinematic pace—best captures how cinema translates the story into a visually driven, momentum-preserving experience. The book's mood remains more measured and the humor more tied to narrative voice than to spectacle.

9. How does Mattie's narration influence the reader's memory of events?

Mattie's voice presents events as a retrospective memoir, not a fresh, real-time account. Because she tells the story from a later point in life, she filters what happened through hindsight, memory gaps, and her own judgments. This means she interprets motives, emphasizes certain moments, and adds emotional tone that colors how we remember the sequence and significance of actions. Her recollection shapes the reader's memory by guiding what details feel most important and by framing events within a moral arc of courage, loyalty, and justice. If the narration were real-time or purely documentary, we'd get a more neutral, less interpretive memory; if there were no personal interpretation, the memory would feel flatter and less engaging. Mattie's retrospective framing invites us to remember the story through her tuned perspective and values.

10. Which statement foreshadowed the rattlesnake bite most clearly?

- A. All the snakes are asleep this time of year.

Foreshadowing is hinting at what will happen later by including a detail that points forward. The line about Chaney threatening to throw Mattie into a pit of rattlesnakes directly ties danger to snakes and to a violent outcome. That specific, concrete threat makes readers anticipate a rattlesnake incident, like a bite, later on. The other statements either suggest safety (snakes asleep or no snakes about) or offer a vague caution that doesn't signal snakes or a future bite. So this line provides the clearest glimpse of the upcoming rattlesnake danger.
