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Explanations

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1. Which organization is responsible for setting international passport standards?

- A. World Health Organization (WHO)

ICAO sets international passport standards. As a UN specialized agency focused on civil aviation and border procedures, it creates the rules and guidelines that ensure passports are issued, formatted, and read consistently around the world. This includes the machine-readable zone on passports, the data elements they contain, and the use of biometric features in electronic passports, all coordinated in documents like Doc 9303. The aim is reliable interoperability at border controls, smoother international travel, and stronger security. Other organizations listed focus on different domains—health, defense alliances, or broad international coordination—without defining passport specifications.

Auditing a minimum portion of badges on a regular schedule ensures ongoing verification and acts as a deterrent against badge misuse. When the rule says no less than ten percent must be audited every six months, it means at least 10% of all badges are checked in each six-month period. This baseline provides a reasonable probability of detecting discrepancies without overwhelming resources. If you audited less than that, the chance of catching issues drops, allowing problems to go unnoticed. Auditing more than the minimum—while still valid—just increases effort and cost beyond what's required. So the ten percent figure is the appropriate baseline since it sets the mandated floor for quarterly checks in a six-month window.

That combination—clarifying when the SSN use is optional versus required—is what makes this statement the best description. It isn't just about how to give the SSN, nor is it about when it's mandatory alone, and it certainly isn't about how to obtain someone's SSN.

The idea being tested is which cleaning liquid best prepares a surface for fingerprint development without disturbing the fingerprint residue. Soap and water is the best choice because it effectively removes surface oils and contaminants that can hide or blur a print, while being gentle enough not to disrupt the fingerprint residue itself. This makes it versatile for a wide range of surfaces and situations, allowing powders or chemical developers to adhere and reveal the print clearly. Distilled water alone doesn't remove oils well enough, so it's not as effective. Rubbing alcohol can be useful on some materials, especially where water isn't available, but it dries quickly and can cause prints to smear or be damaged on certain surfaces. Therefore, soap and water is preferred, with rubbing alcohol as a substitute when water can't be used.

Data minimization is the practice of collecting only what is necessary for a specific purpose. This approach reduces exposure because each data item adds potential risk: if a breach or leak occurs, there's less data to compromise, and it's easier to implement tighter access controls and quicker, safer data handling. It also supports privacy-by-design and regulatory expectations (like GDPR) by limiting what you store and retain. For example, only gathering information essential to a task, avoiding unnecessary fields, and using anonymization when possible keeps the data footprint small and the risk surface narrow. In contrast, broad data collection increases exposure by expanding what could be exposed, unlimited data retention keeps data accessible longer and magnifies risk, and open access would make data available to unauthorized parties.

Maintaining data availability during disruptions hinges on planning for continuity. This involves identifying which data and systems are critical, defining how quickly they must be available (recovery objectives), and establishing concrete strategies to keep or restore access when a disruption occurs. Key elements include regular data backups, replication to off-site or alternate locations, redundant hardware and network paths, and automatic or rapid failover to a backup site, all tested regularly to ensure the plan works. With these measures in place, even if the primary environment is down, users can reach the data through secondary infrastructure, reducing downtime and preventing data loss. Data minimization focuses on reducing the amount of data collected or stored, not on keeping data accessible during outages. Public cloud adoption can help resilience, but it only helps if the cloud environment is configured with proper disaster recovery and redundancy. Frequent password changes improve security, not data availability during disruptions.

The data page is the place that holds the holder's core identifying details used to establish identity. It lists essential personal information such as name, nationality, passport number, date and place of birth, sex, issuing authority, and the issue and expiry dates, along with the holder's photograph and sometimes a signature. It also includes the machine-readable zone to enable quick automated checks. Biometric data is typically stored on the embedded chip in an e-passport, not on the data page itself, and travel history is recorded in border control records and visas, not on the data page. Security features are important for preventing counterfeiting, but they're part of the data page's design rather than what defines its primary content.

This approach reduces unintended risk, supports accountability, and helps maintain security and reliability in high-assurance settings. Rushing deployments without risk consideration can introduce vulnerabilities or instability, and security monitoring remains necessary even with change controls. Centralizing access control is a separate concern handled by identity and access management, not the core aim of change management.

Customs and Border Protection handles the border entry process at airports and runs regular training programs for airport personnel and credentialing offices to keep them aligned with current customs, immigration, and security policies. While the Transportation Security Administration focuses on security screening procedures, its training emphasis is not specifically on credentialing office governance, and the FBI is an investigative agency while DHS is the parent department. So, the agency most associated with regular credentialing-office training at airports is Customs and Border Protection.

Risk management aims to protect assets by systematically uncovering threats, evaluating how likely they are and how severe their impact would be, and then applying controls to reduce that risk to an acceptable level. The best description of the primary goal is to identify, assess, and mitigate risks to assets. Eliminating all risk isn't feasible in practice; some residual risk remains after controls are applied, and the purpose is to lower risk to an acceptable level. Increasing complexity of systems and maximizing downtime are not objectives of risk management—they can introduce more risk and reduce system availability. In Module 2, the process typically involves identifying risks, assessing them, prioritizing responses, implementing mitigations, and monitoring outcomes.
