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Explanations

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1. Which CSS property changes the origin point around which a transform is applied?

- A. transform-origin**
- B. transform
- C. perspective-origin

Transform origin is the point around which CSS transforms rotate, scale, or skew. By default, transforms pivot at the element's center, but changing this origin moves the pivot point so the transformation happens around a different spot. You can set it with values like 25% 75%, left top, or explicit lengths like 10px 20px, and even include a depth value for 3D with a z coordinate (for example, 50% 50% 5px). This is what makes an element rotate around its top-left corner or around any other chosen point instead of its center. Other properties don't define that pivot. The transform property applies the actual transformation functions; perspective-origin determines where the vanishing point for perspective projection is placed, and transform-style controls whether 3D transforms are preserved for child elements.

CSS Custom Properties (variables) let you store a value in one place and reuse it throughout a stylesheet with the var() function. By defining a value on a broad scope like the root, you can apply the same value to any number of rules, e.g., color: var(--primary-color); or background-color: var(--primary-color); This keeps styling consistent and makes updates easy—change the single variable and every place that references it updates automatically. You can also override the variable in specific scopes or within media queries to adapt themes without rewriting multiple rules. Media queries control when styles apply, not how values are reused; inheritance passes values from a parent to its children but doesn't provide a centralized reuse mechanism; the user agent stylesheet is just the browser's default styles.

In CSS, background colors are often written as hex values after a hash, like background-color: #d8d8d8;. The value #d8d8d8 is a light gray (RGB 216,216,216), sitting between white and darker gray. It provides a subtle, neutral backdrop for the navigation, offering enough contrast with darker text or icons without being too harsh. The other options correspond to white, black, or a noticeably darker gray, which wouldn't match the lighter gray used in the sample.

When you log in and shop, you're typically filling out an HTML form. A form collects the data you enter—username, password, shipping address, payment details, and similar fields—inside input controls grouped by the form element. When you submit, the browser sends those values to the server through the form's action URL, usually using the POST method for security so sensitive information isn't exposed in the URL. CSS is used for styling the page, not for collecting data; JavaScript files add interactivity or validation, but they aren't what users fill out. WebGL is about rendering graphics, not gathering form data. So, the thing users fill out in this scenario is an HTML form.

In CSS specificity, the a component counts the number of inline style attributes directly on the element. That's why the inline styles are considered the highest level of specificity: any style written as a style attribute on the element will override rules from stylesheets, even if those rules use IDs, classes, or element selectors. For example, if an element has `<p style="color: red;">` but a stylesheet has a rule like `#header { color: blue; }` or `.highlight { color: green; }`, the inline style wins and the text will be red. The ID, class, and element selectors contribute to other parts of the specificity calculation, but they don't affect the a component. So, the a value stands for inline styles.

Adding the controls attribute to the video element reveals the browser's native playback UI, including play/pause, the seek bar, volume, and fullscreen controls. The attribute is boolean, so simply including it on the tag is enough; the value isn't required. This uses the browser's built in controls rather than a custom UI. Autoplay starts playback automatically and doesn't display controls, so it doesn't expose the UI. The poster attribute just shows an image before playback and doesn't affect the control UI. Using a separate JavaScript UI library would provide a custom control interface, not the native controls.

ARIA live regions are used to announce dynamic changes to assistive technologies. By applying `aria-live` to a region and choosing a politeness level, screen readers know when content inside that region changes and will read the new content for the user. Polite waits until the current speech finishes, while assertive interrupts to announce immediately, which is useful for urgent updates. You can also use `aria-atomic` to control whether the entire region or just the changed text is announced. This approach is ideal for updates like chat messages, notifications, or status changes that appear without a full page reload. Other ARIA options don't serve this purpose: ARIA Hidden hides content from assistive tech, ARIA Label provides an accessible name for an element, and ARIA Role defines what kind of element it is, but none of these trigger automatic announcements for dynamic changes.

Validation checks markup against the rules of the document type, but a single syntax mistake can throw off how the parser reads the rest of the page. Validators often use error-recovery parsing, so once an error is found, the parser may reinterpret the following code in a way that causes more flagged issues—even if that later code is actually valid. This cascade is why you can see validation problems later in the document even when the later markup would be fine on its own. For example, a missing closing quote or tag can make the rest of the line or subsequent lines be treated as part of that error, leading to multiple false-positive issues. That's why the statement about the remaining code failing validation despite being valid describes how validation can behave in practice. Keep in mind, well-formed syntax doesn't guarantee conformance to all spec rules, and validation issues aren't limited to HTML attributes—they can appear anywhere in the markup.

The DOCTYPE declaration mainly tells the browser what version of HTML to expect and, crucially, which rendering mode to use. By specifying a proper doctype, the browser renders the page in standards mode, applying modern HTML and CSS rules consistently. In HTML5, the simple declaration `<!DOCTYPE html>` activates this standards mode across browsers. It's not about character encoding (that uses a separate meta tag or HTTP header), nor about setting a base URL or loading stylesheets (those involve other tags like `<meta charset>`, `<base>`, and `<link rel="stylesheet">`).

Immediate feedback as you fill out the form is what HTML5 inline validation offers. The browser checks constraints like required fields, types, patterns, and lengths as you type or move to the next field, showing messages or highlighting issues right away. This lets you identify and fix errors while you're completing the form, rather than discovering them only after you click submit. When everything meets the constraints, you can submit the form in one go. That on-the-fly correction and single submission best capture how inline validation works in HTML5. It's a client-side feature, so server-side processing isn't required for the validation itself.
