In contrast, financial aid consultations are typically managed by a separate office, such as the Financial Aid Office, which specializes in helping students understand their financial aid options, scholarships, grants, and loans. Thus, the service that is not provided by the Career Center aligns with the responsibilities of a different department within the university, highlighting the specialized nature of each office.
