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Explanations

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1. In long-term studies on children some effects can become either accentuated or obscured because children in either the control or experimental groups are maturing at different rates. This threat is known as?

Maturation refers to natural developmental changes that occur over time. In longitudinal studies with children, these changes can shift abilities and behaviors independently of any intervention. If children in the control and experimental groups mature at different rates, the differences observed at follow-up may reflect where each group is developmentally rather than the treatment itself. This can make effects look larger than they are (accentuated) or smaller (obscured), depending on how maturation progresses in each group. History effects would involve external events between measurements, attrition is about dropout bias, and testing effects are practice-related changes from repeated testing, none of which best capture the described scenario.

Measures are the actual data you collect—the numbers, ratings, or observations you record during a study. They are the concrete data points produced by instruments or observers, like a questionnaire score, a reaction time, or a blood pressure reading. This is different from variables, which are the constructs that can vary; hypothetical constructs are abstract concepts that aren't directly observable, and an operational definition explains how you will observe or measure a concept. Because measures are the direct items that are observed or recorded, they best fit the description.

Sphericity is about the pattern of how related measurements vary from one condition to another. It specifically requires that the variance of the difference scores between any pair of conditions is the same across all pairs. So if you look at the differences for every participant between condition A and B, between A and C, and between B and C, the spread (variance) of those difference scores should be equal. This equality of variances of the difference scores is what sphericity means, and it underpins the validity of the F tests in repeated measures ANOVA. If this equality holds, the statement is true; if it doesn't, the results may be distorted and corrections are typically applied.

In regression, the aim is to explain as much of the outcome's variability as possible using the predictors. The coefficients are chosen by ordinary least squares to minimize the sum of squared differences between observed values and those predicted by the model. By reducing these residuals, the model captures more of the variance in the criterion variable, effectively maximizing the explained variance (often summarized by R-squared). So the coefficients are selected to best account for the variance in the outcome. Residual variance isn't increased—it's minimized. Choosing fewer predictors isn't about how the coefficients are estimated, but about model complexity, not the estimation objective. Increasing multicollinearity would make coefficient estimates unstable and is not a goal of the estimation process.

When you have a repeated measures design, sphericity means the variances of the differences between all pairs of conditions are equal. If this assumption is violated, the usual F tests can inflate Type I error, so you apply a correction factor to adjust the test. That correction uses a value called epsilon, which measures how far the data are from satisfying sphericity. Greenhouse-Geisser and Huynh-Feldt corrections are common implementations that rely on this epsilon value to adjust the degrees of freedom and obtain a valid p-value. Mauchly's W is the test statistic that checks whether sphericity holds, not the adjustment itself, and eta squared is an effect size measure. So the statistic used when sphericity is violated is epsilon.

Debriefing is the post-participation step where you inform participants about the true purpose of the study, any deception used, and how their data will be used, with the goal of returning them to their pre-test state and addressing any questions or distress. It helps restore autonomy, clarify misunderstandings, and ensure participants leave feeling informed and safe. In practice, this means explaining what the study was about, reassuring them about any effects they might have experienced, offering support if needed, and providing contact information for further questions or concerns. This aligns with the option describing informing participants and returning them to their pre-test state. Withholding information, collecting data without consent, or focusing on compensation are not part of debriefing and would violate ethical standards.

7. Collinearity refers to what problem in regression analysis?

Collinearity happens when two or more predictor variables are correlated with each other. This creates redundancy in the information the model uses to explain the outcome, making it hard to tease apart each predictor's individual effect. Because the predictors share variance, the estimated coefficients can become highly unstable and their standard errors inflate, so the conclusions about which predictor matters most become less reliable. In extreme cases of perfect collinearity, you can't estimate unique coefficients at all. The other issues listed are different problems. A correlation between the dependent variable and the residuals points to model misspecification or endogeneity rather than predictor redundancy. A lack of linearity means the relationship isn't well captured by a straight-line (or linear) form. Homoscedasticity refers to the residuals having constant variance across levels of the predictor.

This item is about action research. Action research involves actively working within real human systems to bring about practical improvements, and it acknowledges the researcher's role and influence in making beneficial change. It isn't just about observing a setting; it's about planning and implementing interventions, collaborating with participants, and continually reflecting and adjusting based on what happens. The goal is both practical improvement and generating knowledge from the process, with researchers and practitioners co-creating solutions. Reliability analysis, by contrast, focuses on how consistently a measurement yields the same results across items or occasions; it's a statistical property, not a change-making process. Face validity and content validity are concerns about whether a measure appears to assess the intended construct and whether it covers its domain; they address measurement quality, not intervening to improve the system.

9. Tendency for people to agree with test items as a habitual response is called the response acquiescence set.

This is a response style bias. Some people have a habitual tendency to agree with statements regardless of content, a tendency known as acquiescence or the response acquiescence set. It can skew scores because the respondent's agreement is not tied to the actual truth or relevance of the item, especially when items are mixed with true and false or positively and negatively worded statements. This kind of bias is a measurement artifact that can threaten the validity of the test by inflating or deflating total scores. The other terms refer to aspects of reliability (consistency of scores) or a statistical method (factor analysis), not to a respondent's tendency to agree with items.

The testing effect describes enhanced memory performance on a test after the material has been tested previously. Retrieval practice during testing strengthens memory traces, improves encoding for later recall, and creates useful retrieval cues, which leads to better performance on subsequent assessments even if the material isn't restudied. This is why prior testing boosts later memory more than just studying alone. Other terms refer to different issues: instrumentation threat involves changes in measurement tools, evaluation apprehension is anxiety about being judged, and standardized procedures are about consistent testing methods. Thus, the term that fits this scenario is the testing effect.
