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Explanations

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1. Cantabile designates which style of singing in a line or phrase?

- A. Singable
- B. Loud and dramatic
- C. Muted
- D. Difficult to sing

Cantabile focuses on a singing, songlike line. It tells you to shape the phrase with smooth, legato, lyric flow—a natural, easy, and expressive singing style. That makes it the best choice because it directly describes how the line should feel: singable, with a gentle, connected tone. The other ideas don't fit because they describe opposite or unrelated qualities: loud and dramatic calls for bold, forceful delivery; muted implies a muffled or restrained tone; and difficult to sing suggests complexity or strain rather than the easy, lyrical quality cantabile aims for.

2. Which term indicates a sustained or prolonged sound?

- A. staccato

Sostenuto conveys a sustained, prolonged sound. It directs players to keep the tone resonant and connected, allowing notes to ring for their full value instead of shortening or detaching them. Staccato means short and detached, which would not sustain a note. Unisono is about players sounding the same pitch together, not about duration. Subito means suddenly or abruptly, again not about sustaining notes.

3. What is the relative minor of C major?

In major/minor pairs, the relative minor shares the same key signature and starts on the sixth scale degree of the major key. For C major, the notes are C, D, E, F, G, A, B; the sixth degree is A, so the natural minor built from that note is A minor. Since both C major and A minor have no sharps or flats, they share the same key signature, which is the defining link between them. The other options would each carry different key signatures (C minor with flats, E minor with a sharp, F major with a flat), so they aren't the relative minor of C major.

4. What does Sonore indicate in musical expression?

Sonore signals a tone that is full, rich, and resonant. It's about the quality of the sound—producing something that is round, present, and capable of carrying with warmth and sustained resonance—rather than simply how loud you play. So you shape your technique to produce a singing, well-projected tone with good overtones, rather than a soft, muted, or thin sound. The idea isn't about being soft or quiet; it's about the color and fullness of the tone. A partial or incomplete sound wouldn't fit a sonorous marking, while a full, sonorous tone best matches the instruction to sound with depth and richness. Aim for a complete, resonant sound across the instrument's range.

5. What is the transposition for the Bb trumpet?

- A. Sounds a whole step higher than written
- B. Sounds a minor third higher than written

Transposing instruments are written so their fingerings align with other instruments, while the actual sound (concert pitch) comes from a different pitch. A Bb trumpet is in B-flat, which means it sounds a whole step lower than what is written. So, when you see a written C, the trumpet actually produces a concert B-flat. In general, you move down by a major second from the written note to get the sounding pitch. This is why music for Bb trumpet is written a whole step higher than the concert pitch you want heard. For example, a written D will come out as a concert C, and a written F will come out as a concert E-flat.

6. Which brass instrument typically produces the deepest tones in a wind ensemble?

Deepest tones come from the brass instrument with the longest air column and lowest fundamental pitches. The tuba has the longest tubing and the largest resonating cavity, which lets it produce the lowest notes in a wind ensemble. It typically carries the bass foundation of the brass section, giving that rich, deep sound you hear at the bottom of harmonic progressions. The trumpet is designed for high, bright pitches; the trombone, while lower than the trumpet, still sits above the tuba's range; and the baritone/euphonium fills the low-to-mid range rather than reaching the extreme lows. Therefore, the instrument that typically produces the deepest tones is the tuba.

7. Which term means 'medium tempo'?

Tempo markings tell you how fast to play. A medium tempo is captured by Moderato, signaling a comfortable middle-speed pace—not too slow, not too fast. It sits between Andante (a walking pace) and Allegro (a lively, faster tempo), and performers often aim for roughly 108–120 BPM, adjusting for the piece's character and ensemble feel. Ritardando means gradually slowing down, so it wouldn't be a medium tempo. Più mosso indicates more motion, i.e., a faster pace, which is not medium. Prestissimo means very, very fast, far beyond medium.

8. Which term means merry; lively fast?

Allegro signifies a fast, lively tempo with a cheerful character. It tells players to move with energy and brightness, giving the music a merry, buoyant feel. Crescendo isn't about speed; it's a dynamic instruction to get gradually louder. Adagio means slow and expressive, while andante is a walking, moderate tempo. So the term that means merry and lively fast is allegro.

9. Which factor is included in ensemble balance for wind groups alongside intonation and timbre?

- A. Dynamics

A primary factor in wind ensemble balance is how each note begins and is attacked. Articulation and attack shape the initial energy of every note, which strongly influences how tones blend across players even when pitches are accurate and the tones are similar. If some players start notes with a sharp, percussive attack while others are smoother or longer, the one with the harsher onset can grab more attention, disrupting the overall balance. By aligning articulation—matching legato, staccato, marcato, and the intended onset style across the ensemble—the group achieves a more even envelope of sound, letting the blended timbre and accurate intonation sit together coherently. Dynamics matter for overall loudness, and tempo or vibrato control affect pacing and color, but the start of each note is what most directly governs how the blend sits in the mix, making articulation/attack the key factor here.

10. Which instrument provides the reference pitch for tuning in ensembles?

A. Oboe

B. Flute

C. Trumpet

D. Piano

The reference pitch used for tuning is typically provided by the oboe because its sound is clear and its pitch is very stable. The oboe's reed-driven tone carries well across the room, making the tuned A easy for everyone to hear and match. This stability plus the oboe's ability to produce a precise, consistent pitch helps the whole ensemble align their intonation quickly. While a piano or other instruments can be used as a reference in some situations, the traditional practice in wind ensembles and orchestras is to rely on the oboe for the tuning note.
