Thus, idioms uniquely fit the description of expressions whose meaning cannot be understood through a direct interpretation of their component words.

Flashback is a technique used to take the reader back to an earlier event, providing context or background information, while inference involves drawing conclusions based on evidence and reasoning, which may not necessarily connect directly to forthcoming events.
