The paired samples t-test is the appropriate statistical method for comparing mean scores at different times within the same group. This procedure is particularly useful in longitudinal studies or repeated measures designs, where the same subjects are evaluated at two or more different time points. Since the same participants provide data across different occasions, the test looks at the differences between pairs of observations rather than treating them as independent.
