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Explanations

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1. RKS is the code for which city?

- A. Cody, WY
- B. Rock Springs, WY**
- C. Dodge City, KS
- D. Hays, KS

RKS is the IATA airport code for Rock Springs, Wyoming. IATA codes are the three-letter identifiers used on airline tickets and baggage tags to designate airports. They're assigned to specific airports and don't always spell out the city, but they point you to the right location. In this case, RKS corresponds to Rock Springs. The other cities listed have their own distinct codes (for example Cody has COD, Dodge City has DOD, and Hays has HYS), so RKS uniquely identifies Rock Springs, WY.

2. Which airport code corresponds to North Platte, Nebraska?

- A. MOT

IATA airport codes are three-letter identifiers that map directly to specific airports. For North Platte, Nebraska, the assigned code is LBF, which identifies North Platte Regional Airport (often tied to the historic name Lee Bird Field). The other codes point to different cities—MOT is Minot, North Dakota; EAR is Kearney, Nebraska; and PIR is Pierre, South Dakota. So LBF is the code that matches North Platte.

3. Hartford, Connecticut is served by which airport code?

Three-letter IATA codes identify airports used in travel and aviation. Hartford, Connecticut, is served by Bradley International Airport, located in Windsor Locks just north of Hartford, and its IATA code is BDL. The other codes point to different cities: IAD is Washington Dulles in Virginia, DCA is Reagan National near Washington, DC, and PWM is Portland Jetport in Maine. So BDL is the code for Hartford's main airport.

4. MUC corresponds to which city?

Airport codes like MUC are IATA three-letter identifiers used to designate specific airports. MUC is the code assigned to Munich Airport in Germany, so when you see MUC, it points to Munich, Germany. These codes are widely used on tickets, boarding passes, and baggage tags to quickly and uniquely identify where a flight departs from or arrives. The other common codes you might see map to different cities—London, Frankfurt, and Narita in Japan—so they don't match MUC.

Airport codes are the three-letter IATA identifiers assigned to airports, often reflecting the airport name or the city it serves. The other cities have different codes—Jacksonville is JAX, Pensacola is PNS, and Huntsville is HSV—so they don't match MIA.

You're being tested on how airport codes map to their cities. ECP is the IATA code assigned to the Northwest Florida Beaches International Airport, which serves Panama City, Florida. So, the city and state represented by ECP is Panama City, Florida. Other Florida cities have different codes (Pensacola, Fort Myers, and Jacksonville each have codes that don't match ECP), which is why ECP points specifically to Panama City.

7. What city is associated with the code CZM?

CZM is the IATA airport code for Cozumel International Airport, which serves the city of Cozumel in Quintana Roo, Mexico. IATA codes are three-letter identifiers used worldwide to identify airports in tickets, baggage tags, and flight schedules. The other listed cities have different codes—Cancun is CUN, Puerto Vallarta is PVR, and Mexico City’s main airport is MEX—so they don’t match CZM.

8. Which airport code corresponds to Sacramento, California?

- A. San Francisco, California (SFO)

Airport codes are three-letter IATA identifiers used by travelers and airlines to designate airports quickly and uniquely. Sacramento International Airport uses the code SMF, which comes from its historic name, Sacramento Municipal Field, and remains SMF today. The other examples map to different cities: San Francisco uses SFO, San Diego uses SAN, and Palm Springs uses PSP.

9. NRT corresponds to which city?

- D. Narita (Tokyo), Japan**

NRT is the IATA airport code for Narita International Airport, which serves Tokyo, Japan. IATA codes are the three-letter identifiers used on tickets, baggage, and flight schedules to designate specific airports. NRT comes from Narita, the airport that handles much of Tokyo’s international air traffic. The other options point to airports in Munich, Frankfurt, and London, which have different codes (for example, Munich is MUC and Frankfurt is FRA, while London commonly uses LHR). That’s why NRT matches Narita near Tokyo, Japan.

10. Which city is served by the IATA airport code BNA?

IATA airport codes are three-letter identifiers used to quickly designate airports and the cities they serve on tickets, baggage tags, and schedules. BNA is the code for Nashville International Airport, which serves the city of Nashville, Tennessee. So, when you see BNA, it points to Nashville. The other cities listed have their own different airport codes (Memphis, Knoxville, and Chattanooga correspond to their respective airports), which is why they aren't associated with BNA.
