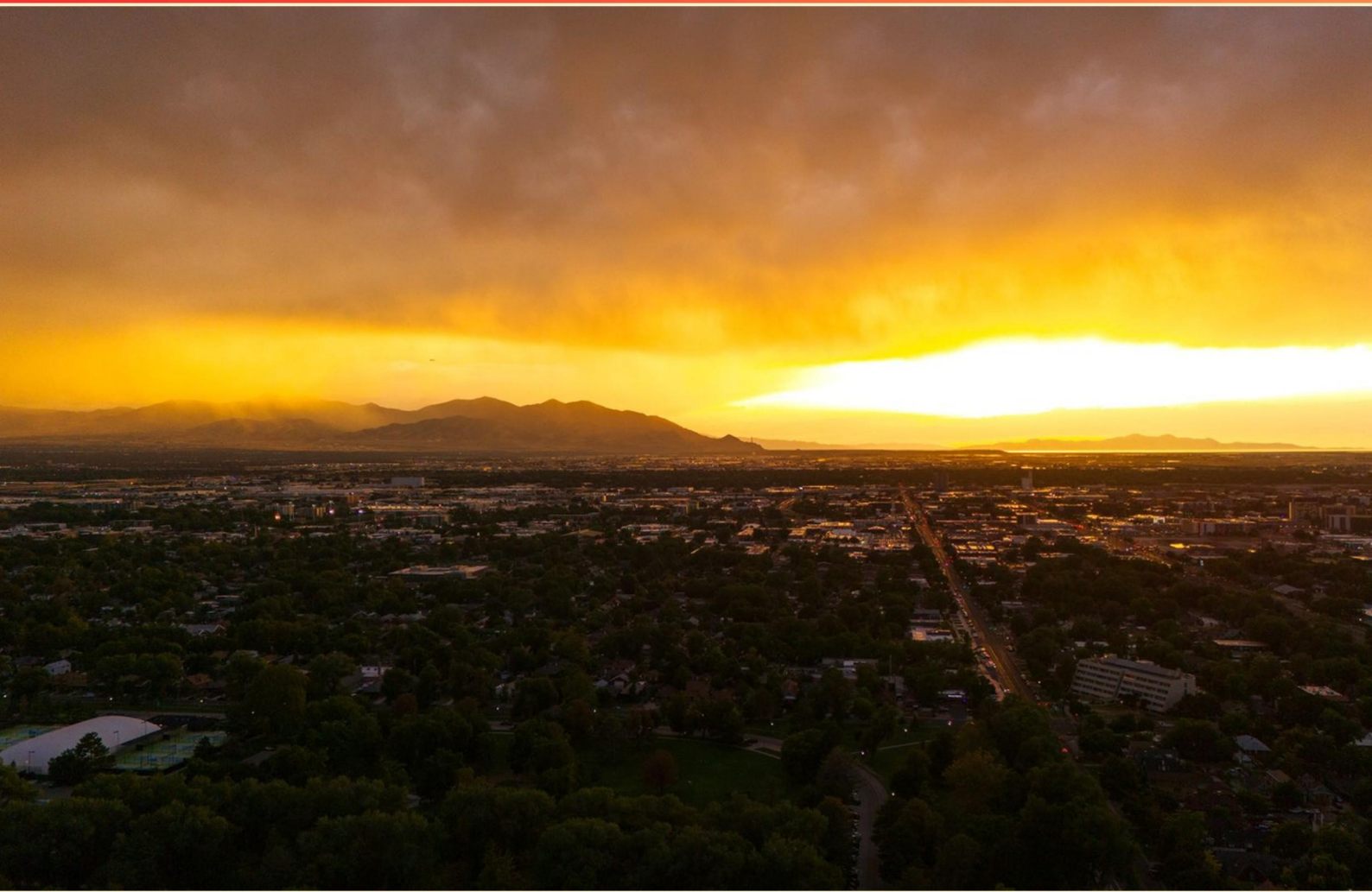

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Explanations

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1. Which airport code is for Dayton, Ohio?

- A. DAY
- B. GJT
- C. HDN
- D. DRO

IATA airport codes are three-letter identifiers assigned to airports to simplify travel and baggage tracking. For Dayton, Ohio, the Dayton International Airport uses the code DAY, which is the standard shorthand you'll see on tickets and luggage tags. That makes DAY the correct match for Dayton. The other codes point to different cities: GJT is Grand Junction, Colorado; HDN is Hayden/Steamboat Springs, Colorado; and DRO is Durango, Colorado. So DAY uniquely identifies Dayton, Ohio.

2. What city is associated with the code CZM?

- A. Cancun, Mexico

CZM is the IATA airport code for Cozumel International Airport, which serves the city of Cozumel in Quintana Roo, Mexico. IATA codes are three-letter identifiers used worldwide to identify airports in tickets, baggage tags, and flight schedules. The other listed cities have different codes—Cancun is CUN, Puerto Vallarta is PVR, and Mexico City's main airport is MEX—so they don't match CZM.

3. ASE corresponds to which city?

IATA airport codes are three-letter identifiers for airports, usually tied to the city or airport name. ASE is the code for Aspen-Pitkin County Airport in Aspen, Colorado. The other cities have different codes—Albuquerque uses ABQ, Denver uses DEN, and Farmington uses FMN—so ASE uniquely points to Aspen.

4. Hartford, Connecticut is served by which airport code?

Three-letter IATA codes identify airports used in travel and aviation. Hartford, Connecticut, is served by Bradley International Airport, located in Windsor Locks just north of Hartford, and its IATA code is BDL. The other codes point to different cities: IAD is Washington Dulles in Virginia, DCA is Reagan National near Washington, DC, and PWM is Portland Jetport in Maine. So BDL is the code for Hartford's main airport.

5. The IATA code ATW maps to which city?

IATA airport codes are three-letter identifiers assigned to airports around the world, usually reflecting the city or the airport name. The code ATW corresponds to Appleton International Airport in Appleton, Wisconsin. The other cities listed have different codes—for example, Milwaukee is MKE, Madison is MSN, and Columbia (Missouri) is COU—so ATW specifically points to Appleton.

Airport codes are three-letter IATA identifiers used to identify airports around the world. For Cincinnati, the airport that serves the area is Cincinnati/Northern Kentucky International Airport, and its code is CVG. This code reflects the region it serves—near Cincinnati, Kentucky—rather than spelling out Cincinnati exactly, which is why it's not simply something like "CIN." The other codes map to nearby Ohio airports: CMH for Columbus, DAY for Dayton, and CLE for Cleveland. So CVG is the correct code for Cincinnati.

WYS is the IATA three-letter airport code for West Yellowstone, Montana, the gateway town to Yellowstone National Park. In aviation, these codes uniquely identify airports and are used in tickets, flight plans, and baggage routing. The other codes shown correspond to different Montana airports—GTF for Great Falls, BZN for Bozeman, and MSO for Missoula—so WYS specifically points to West Yellowstone.

8. What city and state does the airport code MIA represent?

MIA is the IATA three-letter airport code for Miami International Airport, located in Miami, Florida. These codes are the standardized way airports are identified in tickets, baggage tags, and flight information. Orlando's airport uses the code MCO, Pensacola uses PNS, and Huntsville uses HSV, illustrating how codes map to specific cities or airports even if they don't spell out the city name exactly. So the correct pairing is Miami, Florida.

9. Which code corresponds to San Jose?

Airport codes are three-letter IATA identifiers that uniquely name airports around the world. San Jose in Costa Rica is served by Juan Santamaría International Airport, which uses the code SJO. The other options point to different places: SJU is San Juan, Puerto Rico; PUJ is Punta Cana in the Dominican Republic; MBJ is Montego Bay, Jamaica. If you were thinking of San Jose in California, its main airport code is SJC, not listed here.

10. ALB code serves which city?

ALB is the IATA airport code for Albany International Airport, which serves Albany, New York, and the surrounding Capital District. IATA codes are three-letter identifiers used by airlines and travel systems to label airports. ALB is tied to Albany (the city most closely associated with the airport name), unlike the codes for Buffalo (BUF), Syracuse (SYR), or Pittsburgh (PIT). So the city served by ALB is Albany, NY.
