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Explanations

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1. What was the purpose of song-pluggers in the 1920s music industry?

In the 1920s, getting people to buy sheet music was a main way publishers made money. Song pluggers acted as promoters for new songs. Their job was to place a tune with popular performers and in venues where audiences would hear it—vaudeville, Broadway, clubs, or stage showings—and to maintain good relationships with star singers and performers. When a well-known artist performed a song, listeners heard it, liked it, and often bought the sheet music so they could play it at home. This approach turned performances into direct sales and helped a song enter the public repertoire. The other activities described—funding Broadway productions, archiving music in libraries, or writing symphonies—weren't what song pluggers did.

Texture and arrangement in early jazz show how groups balance collective playing with written parts. The Hotel Roosevelt Orchestra stood out by mixing New Orleans-style heterophony—where several players improvise around the same melody, producing overlapping, slightly varied lines—with Chicago-style homophony, which gives a clear melody supported by chordal accompaniment and more structured ensemble passages. This alternating approach creates vivid contrasts within a performance, something many bands of the era didn't do, since some favored continuous collective improvisation or a single, more uniform texture. By weaving these textures together, the orchestra combined the lively energy of New Orleans playing with the cleaner, more arranged feel associated with Chicago-style jazz.

Geometric abstraction centers on reducing forms to precise geometric elements—straight lines, circles, rectangles—arranged with clean edges and orderly composition. It keeps shading out to maintain a flat, two dimensional surface, so the viewer reads the work in terms of geometry and spatial relationships rather than volume or texture. This sets it apart from realism, which uses shading to model light and form, and from movements that foreground broad color fields or expressive gesture.

The main idea here is that photography can be used as a tool for social change, documenting workers' lives to advocate for their rights. Tina Modotti's photographs in Mexico in the 1920s center on factory workers, peasants, and scenes of labor struggle, often published in socialist outlets and linked to the Mexican Communist Party. This focus—showing workers, class solidarity, and everyday labor as a political issue—embodies the Worker Photography Movement's purpose: use images to illuminate social conditions and push for change. Other artistic movements emphasize different aims. Dada leans into absurdity and anti-art tactics, Romanticism foregrounds individual emotion and heroic imagination, and Futurism highlights speed, machines, and disruption of tradition. Modotti's work is less about those aesthetics and more about documenting and supporting the labor movement, which is why the Worker Photography Movement is the best fit.

The number of performances shows how many times the show actually went on stage during its Broadway run, counting every curtain rise from opening night to closing night, including matinees and evening performances. For Show Boat's original Broadway run, that total reached 572 performances. So the count reflects the show's real acting life on Broadway, not just how many weeks it played. In that era, Broadway runs often included many performances each week, so a show could accumulate a large total even over a span of months. If the total were significantly lower, like 472, it would suggest a shorter run or more cancellations. A much higher total, such as 672 or 772, would imply a longer run or more performances per week than actually occurred.

Pre-Columbian architecture, especially Mayan Revival forms, informs the Ennis House. Frank Lloyd Wright used textile-block concrete to mimic the heavy stonework and the stepped, temple-like massing of ancient Mesoamerican complexes. The result is a low, horizontal house with bold, rectangular forms and a textured façade that evokes carved stone. This is distinct from Gothic cathedrals, Victorian houses, or Art Deco skyscrapers, which emphasize verticality, ornate historical detailing, or modern machine-age geometry, respectively. The Ennis House translates ancient temple-inspired design into a modern residence, placing it squarely in the Pre-Columbian tradition.

Chance and randomness are central to Dada, used to upend conventional ideas about who creates art and what makes it valuable. Dada artists reacted to the chaos of World War I by intentionally releasing control over the artistic process. They used chance methods to strip away the artist's hand and the aura of "quality" that traditional craft and taste claimed to guarantee. For example, they would let random actions determine the form of artworks—like dropping cut paper to create a collage or choosing objects and moments by accident or indirection in order to spark surprise and new associations. They also experimented with chance in poetry and performances, disrupting logical meaning to unsettle audiences and undermine pretensions of artistic authority. In this view, art isn't measured by skill or refined technique but by how it challenges norms and invites new ways of seeing. That's why the idea that Dada embraced chance to challenge authorship and artistic quality is the best fit. It captures the movement's intent to redefine what art could be by privileging uncertainty, improvisation, and the viewer's response over meticulous planning or imitation of older styles. The other ideas—favoring precise planning, avoiding randomness, or copying classical art—don't match Dada's rebellious, anti-art stance and its use of chance as a deliberate strategy.

The main idea being tested is how close-up images of workers' hands can communicate dignity, skill, and the social value of labor while critiquing the conditions in which people work. Modotti uses the hands—the tools of the worker—to foreground the physical reality of labor: the wear, dirt, and lines that tell the story of long hours, skilled craft, and dependence on workers' effort. This visual focus invites viewers to recognize labor as essential and valuable, and to question unsafe, unjust, or oppressive working conditions. The other options don't fit as well because they shift the emphasis away from labor and social critique. A close-up of hands centers on human toil rather than mechanical beauty, urban glamour, or isolation, so it aligns with conveying the importance and dignity of labor and critiquing the surrounding conditions rather than celebrating machinery, city life's allure, or solitary work.

9. How long did it take Benton to complete the America Today murals?

The painting project was completed in nine months. This relatively quick timeline reflects how Benton worked on large public murals during that era—scope and urgency often pushed artists to finish a cohesive, multi-panel cycle within a single, intensive push. The America Today murals capture a wide snapshot of American life with Benton's energetic, narrative style, and the nine-month duration shows a focused, steady workflow from planning through completion. Six months or eighteen months would imply noticeably shorter or longer production than the documented schedule, and a full year would often allow more time for revision. The nine-month figure fits the commonly cited record for this cycle.

At the end of a scat chorus, the defining feature is the playful, interactive communication between the singer and the band, with the singer injecting expressive, bluesy tones. This often shows up as a call-and-response exchange where phrases bounce back and forth, and the pitches are colored with blue notes—notes that are bent or flattened to create that soulful, improvised feel. In Hotter Than That, this combination of respond-to-each-other phrasing and stretched blue notes creates a distinctive, humorous finish to the scat section, signaling a smooth move back into the ensemble playing. The other options wouldn't fit this moment as naturally. A rapid drum solo is an instrumental break and wouldn't be the characteristic end of a vocal scat chorus. A key change to a new key isn't typically the defining end of a scat chorus, and a sudden tempo slowdown would feel like a dramatic shift in pacing rather than the familiar, playful close of the vocal improvisation.
