Carpetbaggers were individuals from the Northern United States who moved to the South during the Reconstruction era after the Civil War. They faced significant hostility from Southern residents primarily because they exercised considerable influence in local politics, which often conflicted with the interests of many Southern communities. After the war, the South was reeling from the devastation of the conflict, and the arrival of these newcomers, often perceived as opportunistic and self-serving, was seen as an infringement on local authority and traditions. His focus was primarily on expansion rather than reforming tax structures or establishing prolonged diplomatic relationships.
