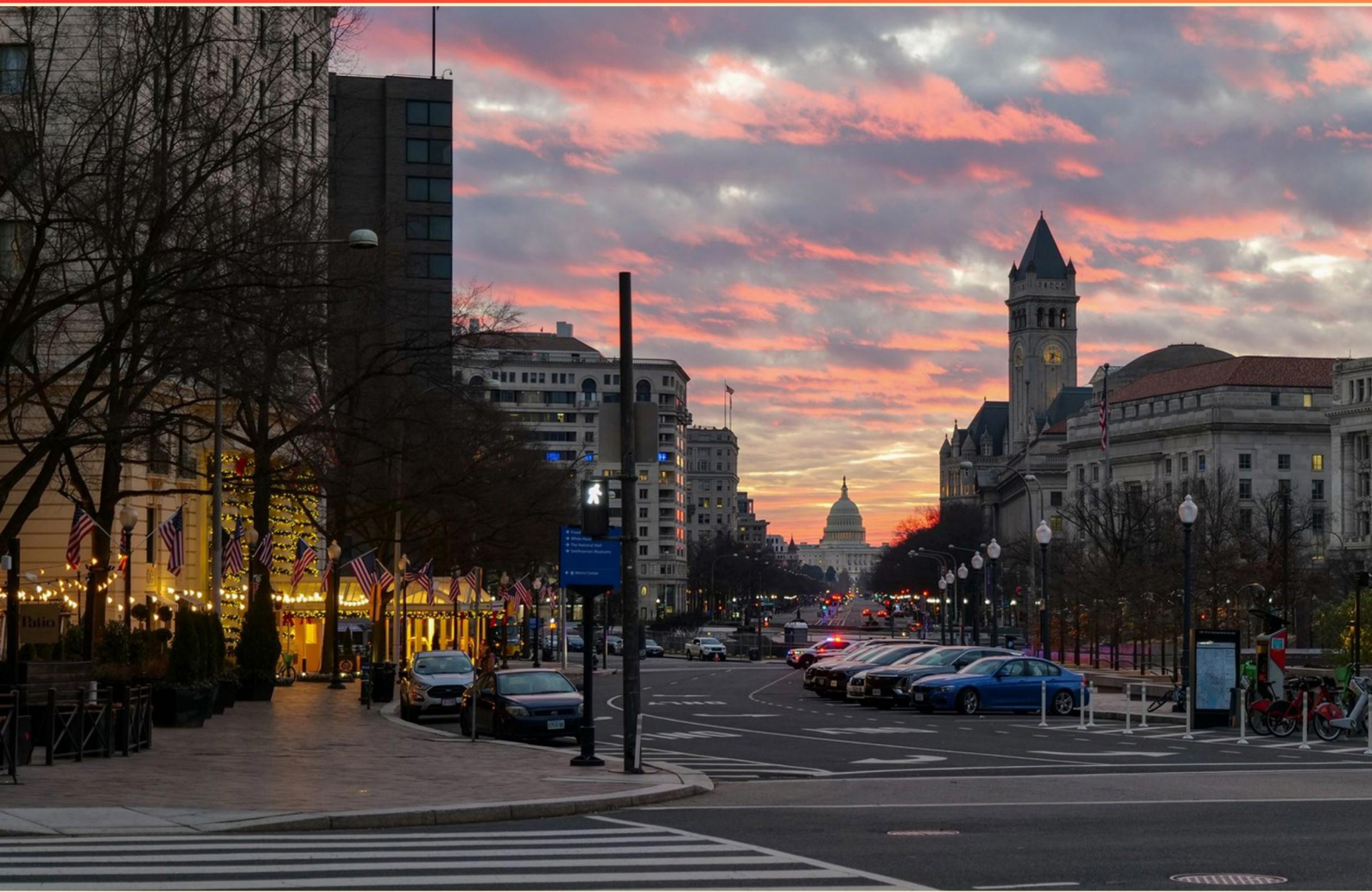

The President of the United States is elected every four years. This four-year term is established by the Constitution, specifically in Article II, Section 1.
