Each of these perspectives approaches religion from different angles, but it is materialism that specifically centers on the human construction of religious truths.

This perspective distinguishes Odu from other spiritual beings or divine figures in Yoruba belief, who may serve different functions in the cosmology and religious practices of the Yoruba people.
