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Explanations

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1. Which term refers to the variation in an environment, i.e., the number of different life forms present?

- A. Ecology
- B. Biodiversity**
- C. Habitat
- D. Species richness

Biodiversity describes the variation of life in an environment—the number of different life forms present. It captures not just how many species exist (species richness) but also the differences among organisms within species (genetic diversity) and the variety of ecosystems themselves. That broader sense is why biodiversity is the best fit for “variation in an environment.” Ecology is about how organisms interact with each other and their surroundings, not just how many life forms there are. A habitat is the place where organisms live, not the measure of life forms. Species richness counts how many species are present, but it doesn't reflect genetic diversity or ecosystem variety on its own.

2. Name a very light silvery-white metal used to make cans and pans.

The main idea here is identifying a metal that is both very light in weight and has a silvery-white appearance, which makes it ideal for everyday items like cans and pans. Aluminum fits perfectly because it has a very low density, so it's lightweight, and its surface looks silvery-white. It's also easy to shape and resists corrosion well, especially important for cookware and food containers. That combination of lightness, look, and practical properties is why aluminum is the metal you see in most cans and many pans. The other metals don't match those characteristics for this use. Iron is much heavier and tends to rust, gold is dense and expensive, and copper is not silvery-white (it's reddish-brown and also heavier).

The idea here is recognizing common phrasal verbs and how “off” changes their meaning. Put off means to postpone something, like pushing back a meeting to a later time, or it can mean to discourage or deter someone from doing something, as in a bad experience that puts you off trying it again. That dual sense makes it the right choice for “postpone or to discourage.” The other phrases don't fit: put on is about wearing or pretending, run out of means you have no more left, and make up for means to compensate for something. So the best option for postponing or discouraging is put off.

4. Which noun refers to the amount of data collected in a study and used to reveal patterns?

Think of the data you collect in a study as the numerical information you analyze to uncover patterns. Statistics is the word that refers to that data itself—the measurements, survey responses, and results you gather to reveal patterns, trends, or relationships. The other terms don't fit this idea: uplift is about an increase in response in some contexts, acidic describes pH, and thumb is a body part. So the best fit for the amount of data used to reveal patterns is statistics.

5. What is the bottom number in a fraction?

In fractions, the bottom number is called the denominator. It shows how many equal parts the whole is divided into. The other terms listed aren't math terms for fractions—kilometer is a distance unit, solvent is a chemical term, and ghost isn't related to fractions. So the bottom number is the denominator.

A segment, by contrast, suggests a defined subdivision or boundary—often part of a structured division—so it isn't as natural for simply signaling a large piece. A portion means a share of a whole and can be large, but it doesn't inherently emphasize size or a single substantial piece. Mass refers to the amount or bulk of matter, not necessarily a piece cut off from something. So chunk most directly communicates "a large part of something."

The idea being tested is how we label someone who helps a learner directly with material. A tutor is someone who works with a student to explain concepts, demonstrate problem-solving, and practice skills—often in one-on-one or small-group sessions. A professor refers to a specific college-level title, not the general sense of teaching. An instructor is a broad term for someone who teaches in a course, but it doesn't inherently imply the personalized, student-focused guidance that tutoring emphasizes. A mentor provides ongoing guidance and development beyond subject-specific instruction, rather than direct teaching of the material. So, tutor best captures the role of a teacher in this sense.

Continuing an action or process without stopping is what carry on expresses. When you want someone to keep going with what they're doing, you'd say “Carry on with your work” or “We will carry on despite the setback.” Carry out means to perform or complete a task, not to keep going. Come across means to meet or find something by chance. Cut down on means to reduce something, like eating less sugar. So carry on is the natural fit for the idea of continuing.

9. Which phrase means to reduce the amount or frequency of something?

- A. Fall apart
- B. Cut down on

The idea being tested is how to express lowering how much you use or consume something. The phrase that fits this meaning best is the one you use when you want to say you decrease the amount or frequency of something—like cutting back on sweets or expenses. You can say, for example, I cut down on sugar, or I'm trying to cut down on my spending. The word cut down on uses a preposition to connect to what's being reduced, which is why it's the natural choice here. Fall apart means to break into pieces or to deteriorate emotionally. Carry on means to continue doing something. Fall behind means to fail to keep up or to lag behind. So, when the goal is to describe reducing how much you use or how often you do something, cut down on is the most precise fit.

10. Which term is a prefix meaning 'very small', such as in microchip?

The key idea is recognizing how common prefixes convey size. Micro- is the prefix that signals small in everyday technical language, and it's the one used in microchip. It comes from a Greek root meaning small, and it appears in many terms that describe tiny scales, like microscope or microgram. In the context of microchip, micro- communicates a small, compact size compared to earlier, bulkier circuits. Other prefixes describe different magnitudes: milli- means one-thousandth, nano- means one-billionth, and pico- means one-trillionth. They're used in other contexts (like millimeter, nanotechnology, picoseconds), but the word that matches the given example and conveys the idea of "very small" in common tech terms is micro-.
