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1. What is one responsibility that is only for United States citizens?

Serving on a jury is indeed a responsibility that is unique to United States citizens. This duty is significant because it pertains to the legal system and ensures that individuals are tried by a group of their peers—a principle that is fundamental to the American justice system. However, jury duty is distinctly a civic responsibility reserved for those who have attained citizenship, setting it apart from other civic duties.

The power to veto bills is held exclusively by the President of the United States. This authority is outlined in the U.S. Constitution, specifically in Article I, Section 7. The Vice President's primary role in legislative functions usually occurs in their capacity as President of the Senate, where they can cast tie-breaking votes but do not sign bills into law. The Chief Justice oversees the judicial branch and the Supreme Court but does not engage in the legislative process

The main adversaries of the United States during World War II were Japan, Germany, and Italy.
