1. Which term corresponds to 'Downstairs' on a vessel?

- A. Above
- B. Below**
- C. Rack
- D. Topside

On a vessel, vertical locations are described relative to the decks: what's closer to the deck or higher up is called above, while what's toward the lower parts of the ship is called below. Downstairs corresponds to those lower levels, so below is the term that fits. Topside refers to the exterior upper area of the ship, not a lower deck, and a rack is a storage or bunk area, not a directional descriptor. In practice, you'd say go below or go below decks to indicate moving to the lower levels.

2. Which code word belongs to the letter H?

- A. Delta
- B. Foxtrot
- C. Echo
- D. Hotel**

Radio communications rely on the NATO phonetic alphabet, where each letter is paired with a distinct code word to prevent mishearing in noisy conditions. The letter H is represented by Hotel. So, among the given terms, Hotel corresponds to H, while Delta corresponds to D, Foxtrot to F, and Echo to E. That makes Hotel the correct choice.

3. Which General Order mandates you to salute all Officers, and all colors and standards not cased?

Saluting is a formal sign of respect ingrained in guard duties, reflecting proper military bearing. The General Order that tells you to salute all officers and all colors and standards not cased directly enshrines this custom, making it the correct rule to rely on in situations where you encounter an officer or see a visible flag. This instruction ensures consistent behavior across posts and duties, so you render the salute whenever an officer is present and when colors are not in a case. Other General Orders cover who you take charge of, how to report violations, or how to handle relieves and calls, but they don't specify the saluting requirement, so they don't apply to this particular scenario.

4. Which term refers to the ship's path as planned before or during navigation, not necessarily the current orientation?

Course is the ship's planned path across the water—the direction you intend to sail to reach your destination, set before departure or adjusted during navigation. It represents the intended route on the chart and is not necessarily the vessel's current orientation. Heading, by contrast, is where the bow is pointed at a given moment, which can differ from the course due to wind, current, or steering adjustments. Bearing is the angle from the vessel to a fixed object or landmark and is used for navigation fixes, not for describing the planned route. Track is the actual path traveled over the ground, which can deviate from the planned course because of external forces. So the term that best fits the description of the planned path is course.

In radio and signaling, letters are spoken with distinct code words to prevent miscommunication. In that system, the letter S is spoken as Sierra. This set of code words is designed so each letter has a unique, easily recognizable sound, especially in noisy environments. The other options correspond to different letters—Tango stands for T, Romeo for R, and Lima for L—so they don't represent S.

The other terms don't fit because the deck is the surface being cleaned, stairs isn't a cleaning term on ships, and scuttlebutt refers to gossip or a water barrel, not cleaning.

9. Which General Order says to talk to no one except in the line of duty?

Talking only in the line of duty is a standard Sentry General Order that emphasizes staying focused and not engaging in conversations that could distract from guarding a post. This directive is all about limiting communication to what's necessary for duty, which helps you maintain alertness, protect sensitive information, and respond quickly to duty-related needs. The other general orders cover different duties—like reporting violations or giving alerts—so they don't specifically impose the restriction on talking to anyone except in the line of duty. That exact wording is what makes this the correct order.

10. Which term describes the ship's intended track through the water?

- A. Heading**
- B. Bearing**
- C. Course**
- D. Track**

Heading is the direction the bow points. When you plan a voyage, you set a heading to indicate the direction you intend to move through the water. In calm conditions, the ship will follow that direction, i.e., its intended track. Currents and wind can push the vessel sideways, so the actual path over ground might differ, but the heading still represents the direction you're aiming to travel. Bearing is the direction to a fixed object, not the ship's path. A course is the planned route, which can be the same as the heading in calm water but isn't the vessel's orientation itself. Track refers to the actual route taken.
