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Explanations

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1. Who led the temperance movement and advocated for helping women?

- A. Frances Willard
- B. Carrie Nation

Frances Willard led the temperance movement and linked it to helping women by turning temperance into a broader reform effort focused on protecting families and expanding women's rights. She led the Women's Christian Temperance Union (WCTU), arguing that alcohol harmed women and children and that reform should include protections at home plus social changes like suffrage, labor laws, and welfare improvements. Her leadership helped transform temperance from a prohibition campaign into a wide-ranging social reform movement that actively involved women in public life. Carrie Nation is known for militant saloon-smashing tactics, but she did not head the national temperance effort. Susan B. Anthony and Elizabeth Cady Stanton were leaders in the women's suffrage movement, not the leading figures of the temperance organization.

2. Which Supreme Court decision solidified students' right to free speech in schools, as exemplified by armband protests?

In this topic, the focus is on how student speech is protected in public schools and when schools can regulate what students say or display. The pivotal idea is that students don't lose their constitutional rights at the schoolhouse gate, but schools can limit expression if it would substantially disrupt the learning environment or infringe on others' rights. The decision in this case established that peaceful armband protests are a form of symbolic speech protected by the First Amendment. Because wearing armbands did not create a material or substantial disruption of school activities, the school could not discipline the students for expressing their views. The ruling sets the standard that schools may regulate student expression only if there is a real risk of substantial disruption or interference with others' rights, not merely because the school disagrees with the message. For context, this took place during the Vietnam War era, highlighting the balance between maintaining order in schools and protecting students' right to express dissent. This decision is distinct from cases about other issues, such as search and seizure, right to counsel, or racial desegregation in education, which address different constitutional questions.

Television became the influential mass medium in the 1950s. As TV sets spread into about 80 percent of American households, people could see news, entertainment, and live events in their living rooms, which gave TV an unprecedented reach and immediacy. This visual, real-time access helped shape public opinion, advertising, and popular culture on a national scale in a way radio or newspapers had not yet matched. The Internet wasn't available at that time, so it isn't a factor. This era is often called the Golden Age of Television because TV became the dominant way Americans learned about and engaged with the world.

They contended that focusing on a private relationship would overstep boundaries between personal morality and official duties, and could set a troubling precedent of prying into personal lives for political ends. That perspective helped explain why the correct choice groups together Democrats and independents. Historically, Republicans pushed for investigation and potential impeachment, while moderates varied and libertarians generally emphasize individual liberty, but the stance described—treating it as a private matter and opposing investigation—aligns with Democrats/Independence.

When a country alters its currency value, borrows more or less, or changes tariffs and subsidies, it can change exchange rates, borrowing costs, and the relative prices of goods and services worldwide. Those shifts affect producers, consumers, and policymakers in other countries, sometimes creating big spillover effects across economies. Educational, healthcare, and civic engagement policies focus on domestic social and civic goals and don't inherently describe how one country's economic tools influence economies elsewhere.

Bimetallism is the monetary policy that uses both gold and silver to back currency. This approach was promoted in the United States during the late 1800s to expand the money supply and relieve debt, with supporters arguing that more circulating currency would help farmers and workers and counter deflation. The idea became a political issue through movements advocating "free silver" and reform-minded leaders, but the term itself names the policy, not a person, act, or group. That's why it's the best answer: it directly describes the monetary system involving both metals.

For contrast, gun-rights advocacy (the NRA) centers on firearm policy, not on family structure or evangelical religious influence. A think tank like the Heritage Foundation focuses on policy analysis rather than explicitly framing issues through evangelical moral lenses. A specific evangelical political group such as the Moral Majority shares these beliefs, but the label that best captures the broader, ongoing group described in the prompt is social conservatives.

Militarism is a broader ideology that valorizes military power, and national service is about mandatory conscription, not the competitive buildup itself.

For example, a company might manufacture in one country with cheaper labor, run a research lab in another with strong universities, and operate a customer support center in a country with multilingual workers. This cross-border setup is the hallmark of multinational corporations. Sole proprietorships are owned by one person and typically stay local. Local businesses operate in a single area, not across borders. Global corporations can describe firms with international reach, but the emphasis here on locating different steps of the business in various profitable locations abroad fits the idea of a multinational corporation more precisely.
