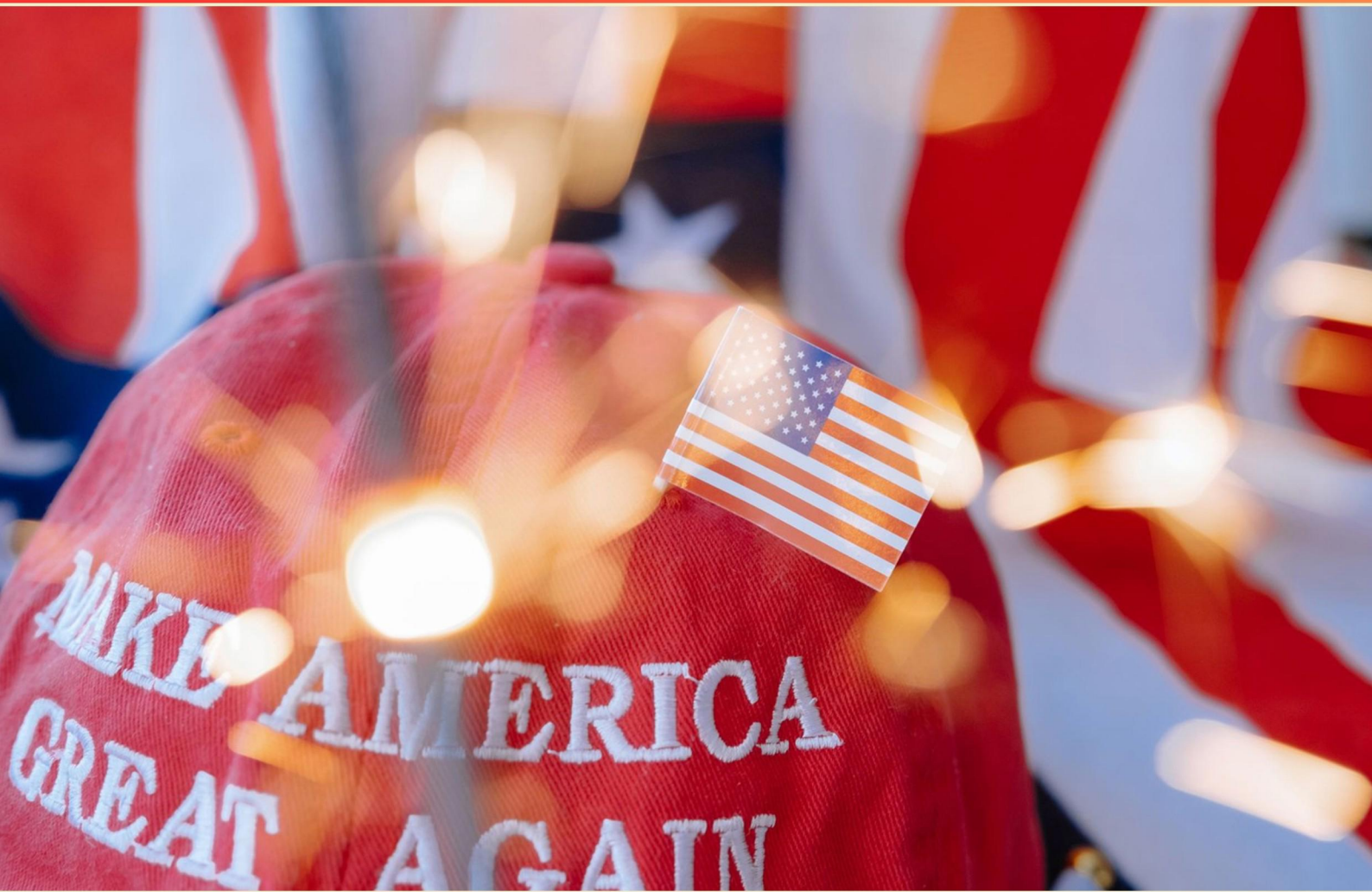

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Explanations

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1. In military time, what number represents 3 PM?

- A. 1500

In military time, hours are expressed on a 24-hour clock system. This means that the day runs from 0000 hours (midnight) to 2359 hours (one minute before midnight the next day). For the afternoon hours, you simply add 12 to the standard hour format to convert it into military time. For example, to determine the military time for 3 PM, you take 3 and add 12, which gives you 15. Therefore, 3 PM in military time is represented as 1500. This reflects that there are no minutes to be added, hence the two zeros following the 15, indicating 00 minutes. Thus, the representation of 3 PM is accurately marked as 1500 in military time.

To convert this into standard format, you consider that hours from 1 to 12 in military time represent the AM period, while hours from 13 to 23 represent the PM period. Since 0200 refers to 2 hours after midnight, this is indeed 2 AM in standard time. Therefore, the conversion of 0200 hours to standard format is accurately represented as 2 AM.
