The Constitution was signed on September 17, 1787, at the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia. This date is significant because it marks the culmination of a process aimed at addressing the weaknesses of the Articles of Confederation and establishing a new framework for governance. The signing of the Constitution represented a pivotal moment in American history, setting the foundation for the federal system of government that is still in place today. The other cases listed have historical significance but relate to different issues. Roe v. Wade addressed a woman's right to choose regarding abortion, Loving v. Virginia dealt with interracial marriage, and Brown v. Board of Education focused on racial segregation in public schools. Each of these decisions tackled critical civil rights issues, but none pertained to the legalization of same-sex marriage, which is solely represented by Obergefell v. Hodges.

Pelosi's experience and influence throughout her time in various leadership roles contribute to her importance in U.S. politics, particularly as a voice for the Democratic agenda.
