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Explanations

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1. If the first referee is experienced, is it still required to have line judges?

- A. True
- B. False**
- C. Not necessarily

Line judges remain a necessary part of the officiating crew because they provide dedicated coverage of the sidelines and end lines, which the first referee cannot watch consistently on every play. Even an experienced first referee relies on these signals to determine if a ball lands in or out, and to handle line-related calls quickly and accurately. The line judges' input supports faster, more reliable decisions and helps ensure the game flows smoothly, with the referee maintaining final authority when needed. So, the presence of line judges isn't negated by the referee's experience—the team needs them for proper court coverage.

2. Between points, what is the primary duty of the first referee to ensure readiness for the next rally?

Between points, the first referee's main duty is to scan the court to ensure both teams and the officiating crew are ready for the next rally. This quick check confirms players are in the correct positions, the server is ready, and there are no issues on the court that could affect play. It's the primary readiness step because it directly triggers the start of the next rally and keeps the game fair and orderly. Tasks like checking the scorecard, reviewing substitutions, or consulting the clock are handled by other officials or are situational, not the primary readiness check.

3. In standard USAV volleyball matches, what is the scoring format and point targets for sets 1–4 and the deciding set?

In indoor USAV volleyball, the scoring format is rally scoring, where a point is awarded on every rally no matter who serves. Sets 1 through 4 are played to 25 points, and the team must win by 2. If the match reaches a fifth set, that deciding set is played to 15 points, also with a required two-point margin. This setup keeps the match moving and provides a consistent way to determine the winner. Beach volleyball uses a different threshold (to 21 in the deciding set, with its own rules), and traditional side-out scoring (where only the server can score) isn't used in standard USAV indoor play. So the correct description is rally scoring to 25 for sets 1–4 and to 15 for the deciding set, with a win-by-2 requirement.

4. Which of the following accurately states the standard net heights?

Net heights in indoor volleyball are set by gender: the net is higher for men than for women. The official measurements are 2.43 meters from the floor to the top of the net for men, and 2.24 meters for women. This matches the choice that lists men at 2.43 meters and women at 2.24 meters. The other options propose different numbers or the same height for both, which do not reflect the standard competition heights.

5. The first referee should never overrule a line judge, since the line judge has the best view.

In volleyball officiating, the first referee has the final say on all calls, with line judges providing assistive input. The line judge may have the best angle for judging whether a ball lands in or out, but that doesn't make their call unchallengeable. There are times when the first referee's broader view or the need to correct a clear miscall requires overruling a line judge. For instance, a ball brushing the edge of a line can be extremely close, and occlusion or awkward angles might lead to an incorrect line call; the first referee can step in to ensure the rally ends correctly. The aim is accurate, fair game management, so line judges inform the decision but do not hold absolute authority over it. This is why the statement isn't correct.

6. Which signal is used to indicate a ball was caught or thrown?

- A. Lift signal**
- B. Out signal

In volleyball, a ball that is caught or thrown is an illegal contact called a lift (held ball). The lift signal is used by the referee to communicate that ruling quickly to players and spectators. This distinguishes a held or carried ball from a clean, legal hit, which must be a quick, decisive contact rather than a pause where the ball is held. The other options refer to different situations: an out signal marks the ball landing outside the court, an end set/match signal denotes the conclusion of a set or the match, and "touch by the left side" isn't a standard signal for this infraction. So the lift signal best represents the call for a ball that was caught or thrown.

7. Whistle should be loud enough to be heard by all participants.

Effective communication on the court depends on a whistle that can be heard by everyone involved. Officials use it to start and stop play, signal timeouts and substitutions, and alert players to fouls or other actions. A loud, sharp whistle cuts through gym noise and ensures players, substitutes, coaches, and nearby officials hear the signal immediately, reducing confusion and helping keep play safe. If the sound isn't audible to all, reactions can be delayed and mis-timed, which isn't acceptable in a coordinated game. So the statement is true because the whistle needs to be loud enough for all participants to hear.

8. In a deciding set, when the team on the left is receiving first, record an X in the first Service Rounds box on both the far left and far right sides of the score sheet.

A. True

B. False

C. Only on the far left side

D. Only on the far right side

In scorekeeping, Service Rounds show when each team serves and how many times they've served in a round. In a deciding set, if the team on the left is receiving first, the team on the right serves first, so you place the first mark in the first Service Rounds box on the far right. You don't mark the far left side at this point because that team isn't serving yet. If the left team were serving first, you would instead mark the far left side. So the statement is false because only the server's side gets the first X, not both sides.

9. Who is primarily responsible for delivering the second contact and directing the offense?

A. Setter

B. Libero

C. Outside hitter

D. Middle blocker

The setter handles the second contact and runs the offense. After the pass or dig on the first contact, the setter uses a precise set to place the ball for a hitter, effectively choosing which attacker to feed based on the defense, rotation, and tempo. Because they're directing which hitter to target and how the ball is delivered, the setter acts like the quarterback of the offense, coordinating timing, placement, and options for the attack. The libero specializes in defense and serve reception, and attackers (like outside hitters and middle blockers) are the players who actually finish the play by hitting.

10. Which of the following is the responsibility of the first referee?

A. Whistling ball handling faults

B. Accepting all line judge calls, even if the first referee sees differently

C. Whistling all net faults

In officiating, the first referee's on-court responsibility centers on decisions that directly control the flow of play, especially ball handling faults. These are calls about how the ball is touched by a player—things like double contacts, lifts, and carries—which can immediately end a rally or restart it. Because the first referee has the best view of the contact with the ball, whistling ball handling faults is a core duty. Line judge calls are provided by the line judges and are not an exclusive duty of the first referee; the referee may use those inputs but can overrule if necessary. Net fault calls, too, are handled within the officiating team, and the question emphasizes the primary, direct on-court control of the first referee, which is calling ball handling faults.
