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## **Explanations**

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**1. Which waterfront facility type is capable of transferring to or from a vessel that has a total capacity of 250 barrels or more?**

The main idea here is that waterfront facility types are defined by the kind of transfer operations they can perform with vessels that meet certain size thresholds. Without a policy-driven basis, such checks would be arbitrary, hard to justify, and could violate privacy or labor rules, and they wouldn't provide verifiable evidence of compliance. The other actions fit naturally: ensuring the security plan aligns with ISPS objectives ensures coherence with the required standards; implementing access control measures helps prevent unauthorized access; and establishing incident reporting and response protocols provides a clear, practiced way to handle security events.

Why the other scenarios fall short: not keeping any maintenance records means there's no verifiable history to prove the system is maintained, which undermines safety and regulatory oversight. Records that exist only after incidents indicate a reactive approach, addressing problems after they happen rather than preventing them. Records that are inaccessible prevent stakeholders from assessing current status or history, eroding accountability and readiness.

The other activities you might think of—looking at financial statements, interviewing every employee, or testing all alarms—are not the primary purpose of this review. They relate to different aspects of operation, resources, or system performance, whereas the focus here is on ensuring authorized status and current, accurate documentation.

That combination—baseline, annual surveillance, and post-exposure evaluation—is what the correct option describes. The other options either misstate the acronym or describe unrelated focuses like PPE or incident response, which are not what OMSEP covers.

This emphasizes that oily wastes are expected to be processed quickly and in a controlled, auditable manner, while ballast water is managed on a different, often longer, schedule. The other options mix these timelines in ways that don't align with the typical separation of notice requirements and discharge windows, making them less consistent with standard practice.
