Fouling an opponent by tripping them is a clear violation of the laws of the game and results in a direct free kick. According to the Laws of the Game, a direct free kick is awarded when a player commits a foul such as tripping, pushing, or holding an opponent. In this situation, a player on the halfway line retains fair status in regards to offside offenses.

In summary, the decision to award a penalty kick along with a yellow card serves to address the infringement while also managing player behavior by highlighting the seriousness of denying a goal-scoring opportunity.
