Thus, "those" is the most appropriate word to convey the intended meaning of cautioning the listener about the potential negative effects of playing a certain collection of video games.

This structure helps convey a future possibility or event. The other options do not fit the grammatical structure required by the sentence.

"Loose" refers to something not tight, "lost" is the past tense of lose and does not work here as the sentence is discussing a future event, and "loosen" means to make something less tight, which does not apply in the context of playing a game.

Therefore, "whose" is the appropriate choice to indicate that the research paper in question is linked to someone.

"Her" is also singular and restricts the reference to female artists only, which is neither inclusive nor suitable for the context. Thus, "their" is the most fitting choice for the sentence.

Free verse, on the other hand, does not adhere to a specific meter or rhyme scheme, which distinguishes it from the formal structure that is
