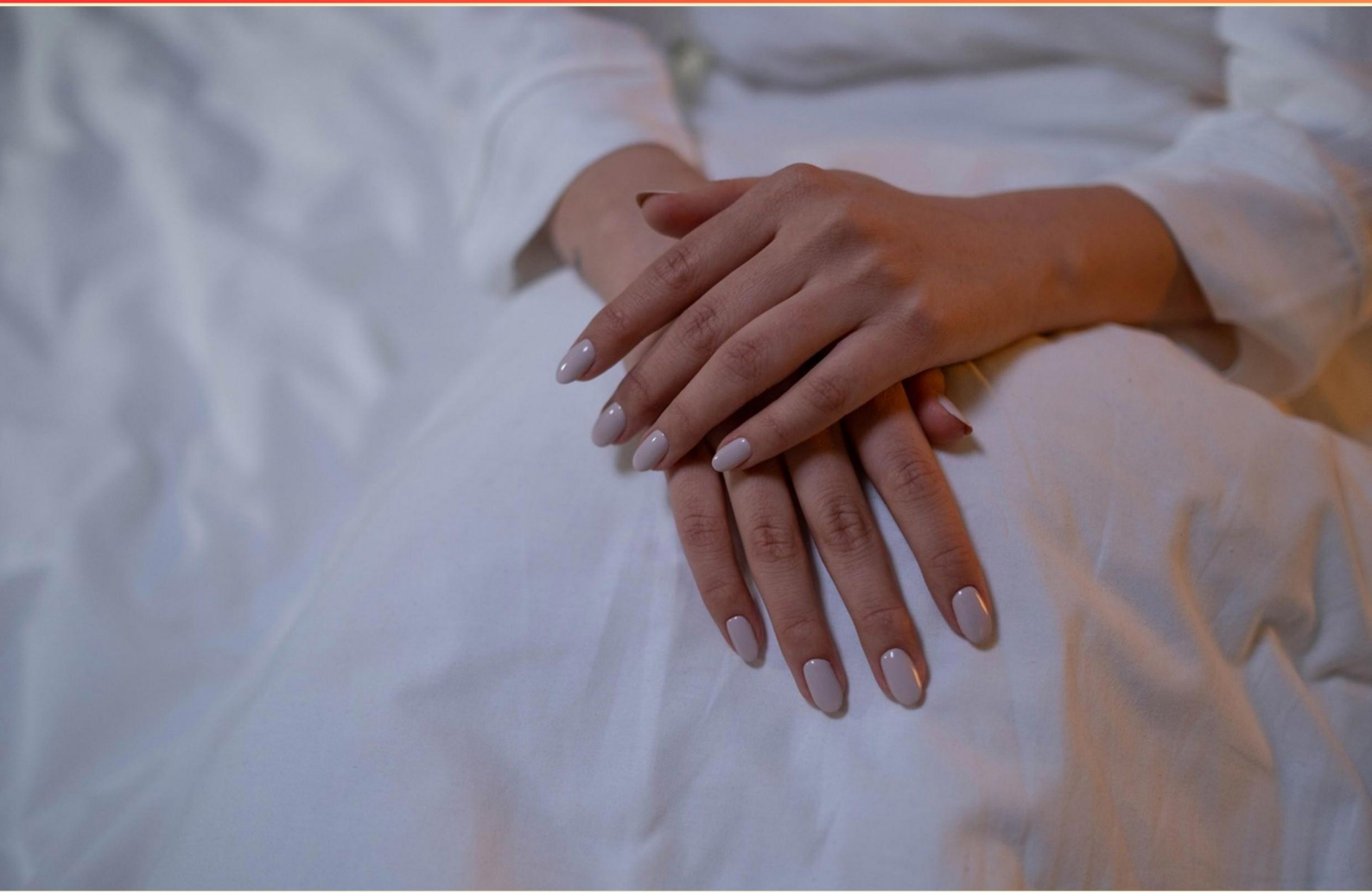

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Explanations

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1. What is the recommended method for mixing nail polish in the bottle?

- A. Shaking vigorously
- B. Stirring with a brush
- C. Rolling the bottle between your hands**

Rolling the bottle between your hands keeps the polish evenly mixed without introducing air. When polish sits, pigments and solvents can separate or settle; gentle rolling redistributes them so the color and consistency are uniform each time you apply it. Shaking vigorously traps air in the bottle, which creates bubbles that ruin the finish and can thin or streak the polish. Stirring with a brush pushes pigment around unevenly, can skim the surface, and doesn't reblend the bottle as effectively as rolling. Tapping the bottle on a table doesn't mix at all and can cause splashes or bubbles. Rolling is quick, simple, and preserves the bottle's consistency for a smooth, even manicure.

Prioritizing is the practice of ranking tasks by importance. It helps you decide what to tackle first based on urgency and the impact on safety and service quality. In a nail service, you'd start with sanitation and safety tasks—disinfecting implements, washing hands, and preparing the workspace—because these steps prevent contamination and protect clients. Once those basics are in place, you handle essential prep for the service and then work through the service steps in a logical order, leaving cosmetic details for later if time is tight. This approach keeps the work efficient and reduces the risk of rushing critical steps. Scheduling, delegating, and organizing involve timing, passing tasks to others, or arranging items, but they don't specifically describe the act of ordering tasks by importance. Prioritizing ensures the most important, time-sensitive tasks are completed first to maintain safety and quality.

Cutting nail tips requires a tool designed specifically for trimming hard tip material. Tip cutters do this job with a precise cutting edge, letting you slice through the tip cleanly and evenly, which creates a smooth edge and reduces the chance of cracking or chipping the tip. Emery boards are for shaping and smoothing after the cut, not for removing the tip. Nail clippers can sometimes cut tips but may crush or deform the edge and aren't as precise for the clean, controlled removal of a tip. Scissors can slip or damage the tip and aren't designed for a uniform cut. For the cleanest, most controlled result when trimming nail tips, tip cutters are the best choice.

When a change happens but no new substance is formed, the material's identity stays the same even if its form or state changes. This is called a physical change, because you're altering appearance, shape, or phase (like solid to liquid to gas) without changing what the substance is. For example, ice melting into water or metal being bent changes how it looks, but it's still the same substance. A chemical change, by contrast, creates new substances with different properties. A phase change is a type of physical change focused specifically on changing state, but the general term that covers all such changes is physical change.

The main idea is the terminology for the tools used to perform nail services. Those tools are called implements. They include items like nail clippers, cuticle pushers, nippers, files, and buffers, and they can be reused after proper cleaning and disinfection or disposed of after a single use. The other terms describe services or rules rather than the tools themselves: massage is a service, manicure is the service, and scope of practice refers to what a technician is permitted to do in their profession. So the correct term for the tools used, which can be reusable or disposable, is implements.

6. Which statement best describes torque in an electric file?

Torque is the twisting force the motor can apply to the drill bit. In an electric file, that determines how well the tool keeps spinning when you press against the nail or gel—the resistance you feel is the load. So torque describes the machine's ability to keep turning under pressure, meaning how well it avoids stalling under load. It's not about the tool's weight, the speed of rotation, or the power source.

7. Which type of nerve fibers react to heat, cold, touch, pressure, and pain?

Sensory (afferent) nerve fibers. These fibers carry information from skin receptors that detect heat, cold, touch, and pressure, as well as pain signals, up to the spinal cord and brain. Motor fibers send commands from the CNS to muscles, interneurons connect neurons within the CNS to process information, and autonomic fibers regulate involuntary functions. Therefore, the fibers that react to those stimuli are sensory fibers.

8. A(n) ____ is a term used to describe different types of nail files and buffers.

In nail care, the things that file and smooth nails are described by the material on their surface. That material is called abrasive, which is why it's the term used to describe the different types of nail files and buffers. You'll see varieties like emery boards, glass files, ceramic files, and buffers all classified by their abrasive surface. Grit refers to the numeric coarseness of that abrasive, not the overall category of the tool. Coarse describes a level of grit, not the whole family of filing tools, and a buffer is a specific type of tool used for smoothing, not the general description of all filing surfaces. So the best term that covers the different nail files and buffers is abrasive.

9. _____ is an inflammation of the matrix and shedding of the nail caused by infection or injury.

Nail diseases involve changes to the nail unit, and the term that encapsulates a diseased condition of the nail itself is onychosis. When the matrix (the tissue that makes the nail) becomes inflamed and the nail sheds due to infection or injury, this fits the broader idea of a nail disorder, which is what onychosis describes in this context. Paronychia describes inflammation around the nail fold, not the matrix itself, so it doesn't capture the core issue described. The lunula is simply the visible, pale crescent area at the base of the nail and is not a disease. Onychomadesis refers to shedding from a temporary stoppage in nail growth, which can occur after illness or trauma, but it emphasizes growth arrest rather than inflammation of the matrix. The wording here points to a nail disease affecting the matrix and causing shedding, best described by onychosis.

10. What describes a material that does not transmit electricity?

The material that does not transmit electricity is an insulator. An insulator binds its electrons tightly, so electric current doesn't flow through it easily. This is why salon tools and their casings use plastic, rubber, or glass to keep electricity from reaching your skin. In contrast, a conductor lets current pass readily; a resistor limits current but still conducts; a semiconductor can conduct under certain conditions, so it isn't inherently non-conductive.
