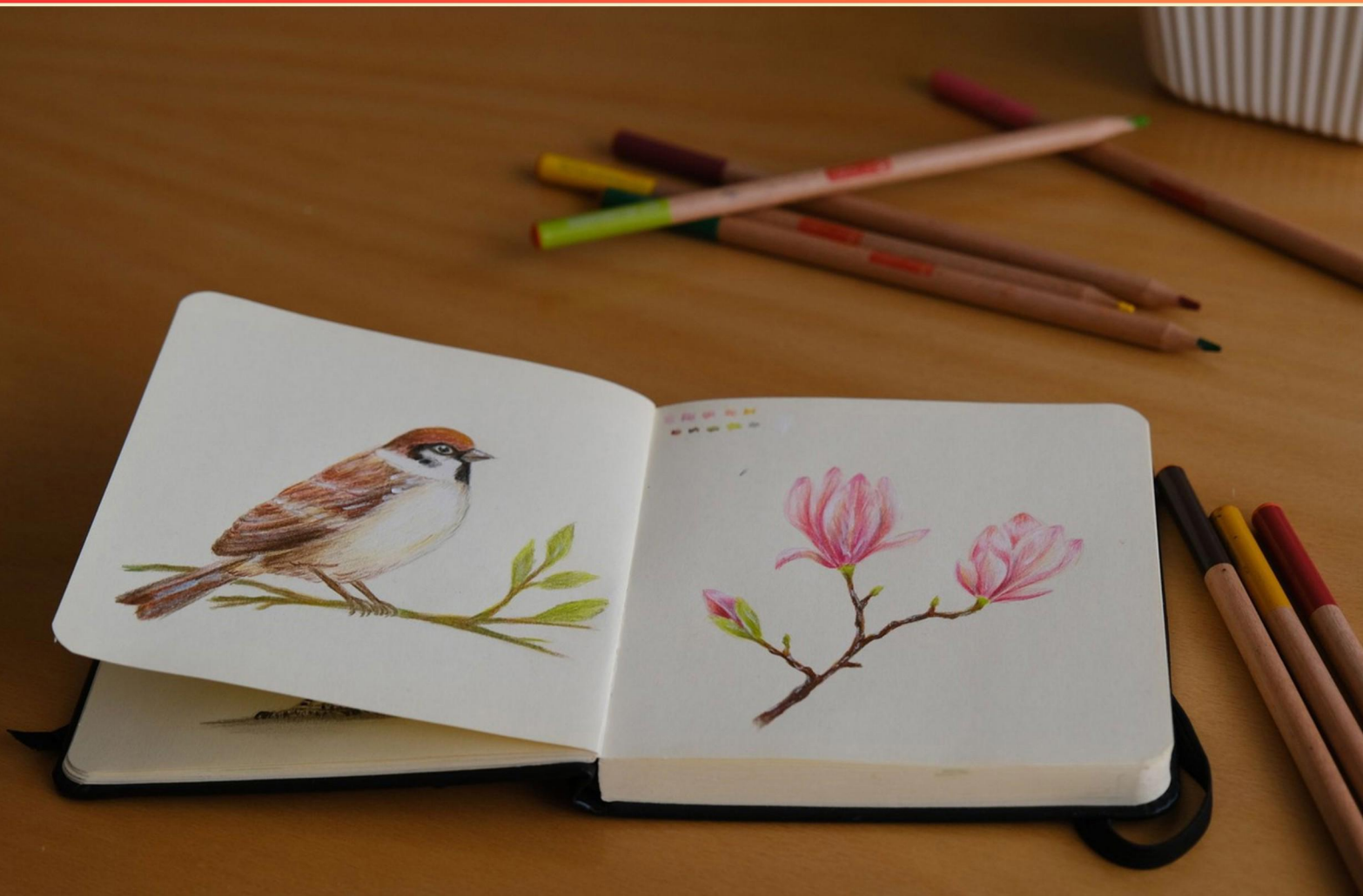

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Explanations

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1. Which term best matches the concept of expanding power by controlling other lands or peoples?

- A. Industrialization
- B. Indian Removal Act
- C. Imperialism**

Expanding power by controlling other lands or peoples is imperialism. This idea describes a nation extending its influence beyond its borders through colonization, political control, or economic dominance to gain power, resources, or strategic advantages. Industrialization is about building industry and technology, which can support imperial ambitions but isn't itself about taking control of other lands. The Indian Removal Act was an internal policy relocating Indigenous peoples within the United States, not expansion across borders. Isolationism is avoiding involvement with other nations, the opposite of expanding influence. So imperialism is the term that best fits the description.

This question focuses on blitzkrieg, a military tactic defined by a rapid, decisive strike intended to overwhelm an opponent quickly. The idea is to fuse speed, surprise, and concentrated firepower by coordinating fast-moving armored units with close air support and infantry to break through defenses before the enemy can react, disrupt command and control, and potentially encircle forces. The goal is to shorten a campaign by forcing rapid, disorganized retreats rather than dragging on in grinding battles. The other terms don't fit: boomtown refers to a town that grows quickly due to economic activity, capitalism is an economic system, and the Berlin Wall was a physical barrier built during the Cold War. So the best match for a fast, overwhelming assault is blitzkrieg.

3. Which event is turning the tide in the Pacific theater during World War II?

Momentum in the Pacific theater shifted after the Battle of Midway. In June 1942, American codebreakers uncovered Japan's plans and the U.S. Navy lured the Japanese into an ambush. The clash cost Japan four aircraft carriers and many experienced pilots, while the United States lost one carrier, Yorktown. The overwhelming Japanese carrier loss halted their offensive expansion and swung the initiative to the Allies for the rest of the war, enabling a shift to offensive operations across the central and then the southern Pacific. From here, the Allies could pursue island hopping and build up naval and air power toward Japan. The other options don't fit this turning-point idea: they relate to economic panic, a group of nations, or prejudice, none of which describe a military event that changed the Pacific war's momentum.

4. Which term refers to crowded apartment buildings where immigrant families lived in poor conditions?

Tenements describe crowded apartment buildings where immigrant families lived in poor conditions. In late 19th and early 20th century American cities, many newcomers from various regions squeezed into these cramped, poorly built units with limited ventilation, shared facilities, and high fire risk. This term specifically names the type of urban housing associated with that era's immigrant experience, making it the most accurate choice. The other options refer to different ideas: territories are geographic regions, The Great Migration describes a large northernward move of African Americans, and the Trail of Tears refers to the forced relocations of Native American tribes.

5. Which World War II battle in the Pacific near the end of the war involved U.S. forces fighting for control of the island?

The main idea here is recognizing the late-war Pacific battles that aimed to seize and hold key islands to support the push toward Japan. Okinawa fits this description exactly: fought from April to June 1945, it was one of the largest and bloodiest amphibious assaults of the Pacific campaign and occurred right toward the end of World War II. Its objective was to establish a base for air operations and future invasions, making control of the island a strategic necessity as the war moved closer to Japan's home soil. Midway happened earlier, in 1942, and changed the course of the war in the Pacific but isn't late-war. Guadalcanal was the first major Allied offensive in the Pacific, occurring in 1942–43. Iwo Jima, while also late in the war and costly, was primarily about securing a crucial airfield to support bombing missions, not about a broader late-war objective to control a staging island for the final campaigns. Okinawa best matches the description of a late-war island-fighting battle designed to gain a substantial forward base.

A railroad that connects the east and west coasts is called the transcontinental railroad. It describes a single continuous rail line that spans a continent, enabling cross-country travel and commerce in one route. In United States history, the first successful transcontinental railroad was completed in 1869 when the Union Pacific and Central Pacific railroads joined at Promontory Summit, Utah, linking the Atlantic and Pacific coasts. The other terms refer to things unrelated to rail lines: tenements are crowded urban housing, The Great Migration was the movement of African Americans to northern cities, and Territory/Territories are political divisions. So the term that best fits is transcontinental railroad.

7. What idea discouraged nuclear war by suggesting that a nuclear attack by one power would result in devastating retaliation by all sides?

A. MAD / Mutually Assured Destruction

Mutually Assured Destruction is the idea that if one power launches a nuclear attack, others would respond with devastating retaliation, making war between nuclear-armed states irrational. This relies on credible second-strike capability—each side knowing it can devastate the other even after being struck first. Because the potential damage is so catastrophic for all involved, leaders are deterred from initiating a nuclear conflict. Deterrence theory speaks to preventing aggression through threats in general, but MAD is the specific nuclear-level mechanism that explains why such a war would be avoided. Nuclear parity and arms control relate to balance of power and reducing arsenals, respectively, but the scenario described is best explained by the deterrent effect of assured, catastrophic retaliation.

The main idea is naming the policy that forced Japanese Americans into government camps during World War II. The best term for this is Japanese internment camps because it directly labels the act (internment) and specifies who was targeted (Japanese Americans). This phrasing is the standard historical label used to describe the policy, capturing both the coercive confinement and the group affected. The official designation for the camps themselves was War Relocation Centers, which refers to the facilities, not the policy itself. Detention camps and internment housing are generic terms and not the established way historians describe the wartime policy.

During the Cold War, the Soviet Union and its Eastern European communist allies formed a formal military alliance to coordinate defense and maintain influence in the region. This bloc was the Warsaw Pact, created in 1955 as a counterweight to NATO. It united the Soviet Union with several satellite states—East Germany, Poland, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Romania, Bulgaria, and later Albania—under a single military command and mutual defense commitments. This arrangement reinforced the East–West divide and gave the Soviet Union a centralized mechanism to project power across Eastern Europe. The other options don't fit the concept: Westward Expansion pertains to U.S. territorial growth, Yellow Journalism refers to sensationalist news reporting, and the Vietnam War is a separate conflict in Southeast Asia.

10. Which government agency helped formerly enslaved people and poor whites in the South by providing food, schools, and legal help?

A. Freedmen's Bureau

B. Bureau of Indian Affairs

C. Department of Education

D. Civil Works Administration

Relief and support programs created during Reconstruction aimed to help newly freed people and poor white Southerners. The agency in question was established to provide food, schools, and legal assistance, along with other aid, to help families transition from slavery to freedom and rebuild communities. It organized schools for both Black and white children, offered medical care and housing aid, and supplied legal help to defend rights and navigate new labor arrangements. This focus on education, daily sustenance, and legal protection defines its role during that period. Other options fit different times or populations: the Bureau of Indian Affairs handled Native American affairs; the Department of Education did not exist as a separate agency in that era; and the Civil Works Administration was a New Deal program from the 1930s.
