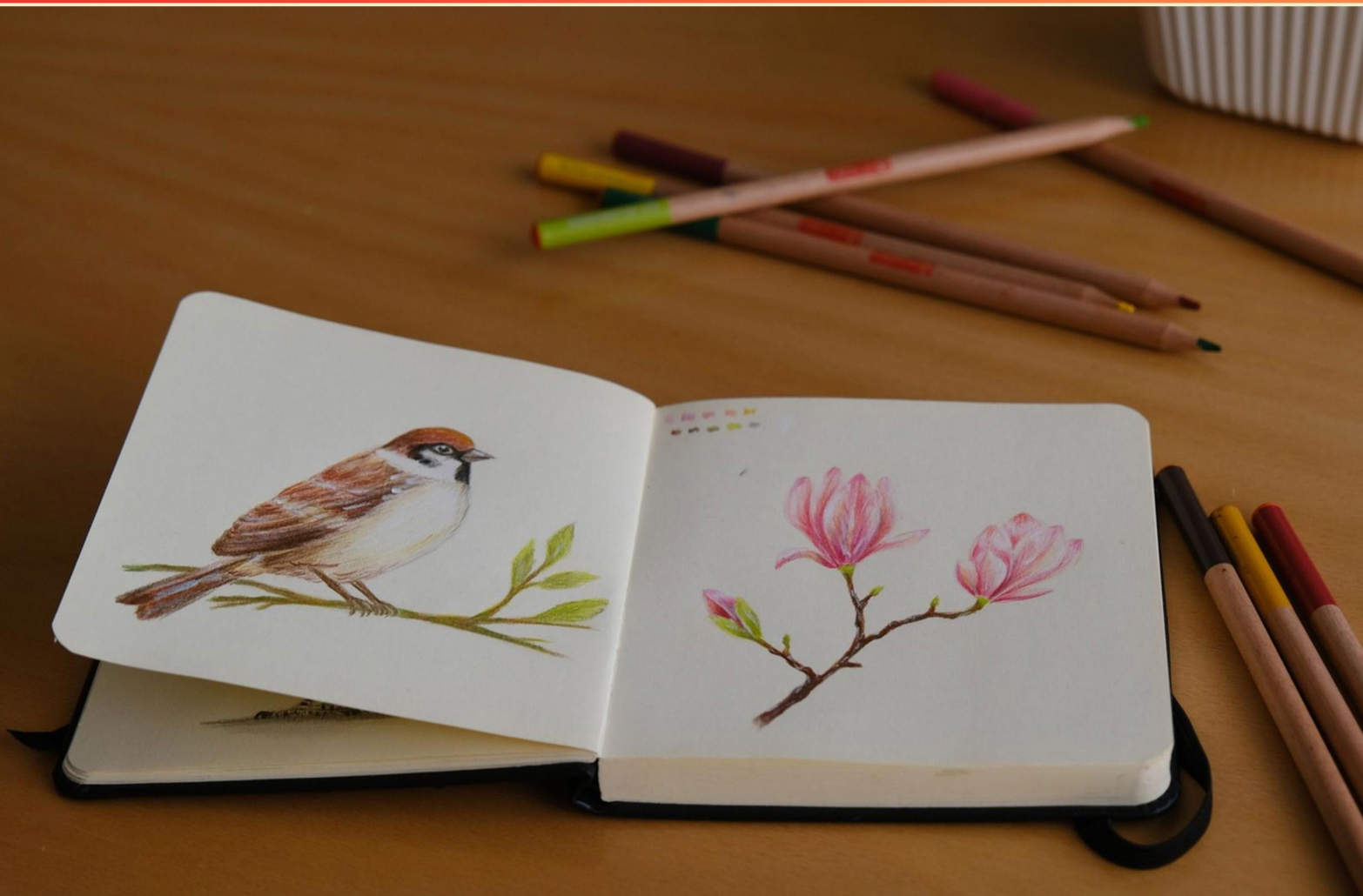

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Explanations

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1. What is the term for the gathering of soldiers and supplies in preparation for war?

Mobilization is the process of assembling and readying armed forces and the supporting resources for war. It covers calling up soldiers, equipping them, provisioning supplies, and moving troops and matériel into position. This directly matches the idea of gathering both people and materials in preparation for conflict. The other terms refer to unrelated ideas—economic consolidation, investigative journalism, or a civil rights organization—so they don't describe preparing for war.

2. An economic downturn is called what?

The other options don't fit because they describe different ideas: Pearl Harbor is a historical military attack, propaganda is biased information used to influence opinions, and reconstruction means rebuilding after damage. So the term that captures a downturn in economic activity is recession.

Expansionism refers to extending a nation's power by acquiring new territory. The other terms don't fit as well: isolationism is about staying out of international conflicts, globalization means increasing global interconnectedness and exchange, and militarism emphasizes military buildup and use of force as a policy tool—but not necessarily land expansion. Expansionism best captures the concept of growing power through territorial acquisition.

Democracy is the system in which people elect leaders to govern on their behalf. Through elections, citizens choose representatives who make laws and run the government, with accountability to the people. This setup ensures political power comes from the governed and can be removed at elections. A dictatorship describes rule by a single leader or small group without such elections. A domino effect is a chain reaction, not a government form, and the Dust Bowl was an environmental disaster, not a political system.

Focusing on how news outlets used dramatic, exaggerated reporting to shape how people thought, this practice is yellow journalism. In the late 19th century, newspapers competed for readers with bold headlines and sensational, sometimes inflated stories. The aim was not just to inform but to influence public opinion and spark action, contributing to public attitudes about events like Cuba and the Spanish-American War. The other options refer to unrelated topics: westward expansion is about territorial growth, victory gardens were a WWII home-front program, and the Vietnam War denotes a specific conflict.

6. In international relations, what term describes a country that does not participate in armed conflicts and avoids alliances?

Neutrality is the stance of a country that does not participate in armed conflicts and avoids formal alliances. It stays impartial, does not take sides in wars, and does not bind itself to collective defense pacts. This differs from interventionism, which involves actively taking part in conflicts on one side; pacifism, while rooted in opposing war, is a broader ethical stance rather than a specific state posture in international relations; and nonalignment, which avoids blocs, can still involve engagement in coalitions or conflicts. So neutrality best fits the description.

The wall stretched across the city with guard towers and checkpoints, effectively sealing off both sides for decades until it fell in 1989 as East and West Germany moved toward reunification. The other terms refer to different events or ideas: the Berlin Airlift was the 1948–49 effort to supply West Berlin by air during a Soviet blockade; Big Stick Diplomacy is a Roosevelt-era foreign policy approach; the Bonus Army was a 1932 veterans' protest in Washington, D.C.

Exodusters describe formerly enslaved African Americans who moved west after emancipation seeking a new start. The term comes from a biblical Exodus, signaling a journey from oppression toward freedom and opportunity. They mostly headed to Kansas and nearby plains in the late 1870s and early 1880s to own land, escape debt and violence, and build independent communities. This movement is specific to Black migration after slavery, not just any land-seeking settlers. Other labels like homesteaders, migrants, or pioneers describe broader groups and don't capture this particular historical context.

9. Which World War II battle in the Pacific near the end of the war involved U.S. forces fighting for control of the island?

The main idea here is recognizing the late-war Pacific battles that aimed to seize and hold key islands to support the push toward Japan. Okinawa fits this description exactly: fought from April to June 1945, it was one of the largest and bloodiest amphibious assaults of the Pacific campaign and occurred right toward the end of World War II. Its objective was to establish a base for air operations and future invasions, making control of the island a strategic necessity as the war moved closer to Japan's home soil. Midway happened earlier, in 1942, and changed the course of the war in the Pacific but isn't late-war. Guadalcanal was the first major Allied offensive in the Pacific, occurring in 1942–43. Iwo Jima, while also late in the war and costly, was primarily about securing a crucial airfield to support bombing missions, not about a broader late-war objective to control a staging island for the final campaigns. Okinawa best matches the description of a late-war island-fighting battle designed to gain a substantial forward base.

10. Which unit was a Japanese American U.S. Army unit that served in Europe and became highly decorated?

D. 442nd Regimental Combat Team

The main idea here is recognizing a famous World War II unit built from Japanese American volunteers that fought in Europe and earned an extraordinary number of decorations. This unit is the 442nd Regimental Combat Team. Comprised largely of Nisei—Japanese Americans born in the United States—the 442nd deployed to the European theater, waging hard-fought battles in Italy and France and becoming renowned for their courage and perseverance. Their record includes many individual and unit honors, reflecting why they are remembered as among the most decorated units in U.S. Army history for their size and length of service. The other choices refer to different units or to a vague descriptor that doesn't name the specific, historically recognized unit known for both its Japanese American composition and its European combat valor.
