Similarly, airborne precautions are more relevant to diseases that are spread through very small particles that linger in the air, and protective isolation is used for clients with compromised immune systems rather than for infectious diseases like mononucleosis.

While other options may focus on hygiene practices or encouragements towards testing, they do not directly address the specific modes of transmission associated with hepatitis C as effectively as avoiding the sharing of razors.
