The option regarding sweaters for use in air-conditioned areas is not considered personal protective equipment (PPE) and is, therefore, the correct choice. Personal protective equipment is specifically designed to protect the wearer from specific hazards in the workplace, such as exposure to chemicals, biological agents, or physical hazards. In contrast, gloves, face masks, and safety goggles are all essential components of PPE used to safeguard against various health risks.
