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Explanations

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1. What is the combined percentage of Firegrounds (35%) and Normal Station Duty (15%)?

- A. 45%
- B. 65%

Adding portions of a whole means summing the percentages. 35% plus 15% equals 50%, so the combined percentage is 50%. This assumes these two parts come from the same total and don't overlap. The other numbers would require different given values.

2. What is the purpose of warning lights and sirens in emergency mode?

- A. To decorate the vehicle.
- B. To ignore traffic laws.
- C. To request the right-of-way through traffic.**

The warning lights and sirens exist to signal other road users to yield the right-of-way so the emergency vehicle can reach the scene quickly and safely. They provide a clear, urgent indication that an incident requires priority travel, allowing the unit to move through traffic with fewer delays. It's not a decorative feature or a license to break rules; it's a legal and safety signal that you must respond to by slowing down, pulling over to the right and stopping if needed, and only proceeding when the path is clear and the vehicle has passed.

The main idea is that EMS driving privileges allow a driver to proceed through certain traffic controls during an emergency, but only when exercising caution and using warning devices. Driving through red lights or stop signs is listed as a privilege because, in an urgent response, getting to the scene quickly can be necessary, and the driver is expected to carefully assess the situation, yield to other road users when needed, and proceed with warning devices active. This isn't a free pass to ignore safety rules; it's a controlled exception used to reach emergencies faster. Traveling the wrong way on a road is unsafe and generally illegal, speed is governed and must be appropriate to conditions, and while operating under privilege you still have the obligation to act with safety and awareness of others; those elements describe responsible use rather than a specific listed privilege.

Fireground operations place firefighters in the midst of active, high-hazard conditions—extreme heat, smoke, structural risk, and rapidly changing situations. That on-scene environment inherently carries more immediate danger, so a larger share of on-duty firefighter deaths occur there. The 35% figure reflects that reality, making it the most representative choice among the options. The other percentages are smaller, which would understate the risk present during active incident response. This is why incident scene safety, continuous risk assessment, and disciplined adherence to procedures are central themes in EVDT training.

5. What percent of On Duty Firefighter Deaths occurred in EMS activities?

The main idea is understanding how on-duty firefighter deaths are distributed by activity, specifically how often they occur during EMS work. Four percent is the best answer because, in the data used for this material, EMS activities account for only a small portion of on-duty fatalities. Even though EMS calls pose real risks, the majority of deaths tend to happen during fireground operations, rescues, or other duties, so the EMS category remains a relatively small slice of the total. Choosing a higher percentage would imply EMS work is a much larger cause of fatalities than the data shows, while four percent accurately reflects the typical proportion in this context.

Mitigation means taking steps to reduce risk by changing the way you act or operate to lower the chance of a loss or its severity. The phrasing describes altering acts or practices to limit negative outcomes, which is exactly what mitigating risk looks like in practice. In emergency vehicle driving this could involve slowing for weather or road conditions, maintaining safe following distances, securing equipment, and following standard procedures to prevent hazards from causing harm. Accepting all risks isn't mitigation, increasing equipment purchases alone doesn't necessarily reduce risk unless paired with proper practices, and ignoring hazards is not mitigation and increases danger.

7. In adverse weather, tire condition is important because

In adverse weather, tire condition matters because traction is what lets you keep control of the vehicle on slick surfaces. Proper tread and correct inflation help the tire maintain a solid contact patch with the road and effectively channel water or slush away, reducing the chance of sliding and improving steering, acceleration, and braking response. Worn tread or incorrect pressure reduces grip, lengthens stopping distances, and increases the risk of skidding or hydroplaning when you need to maneuver or stop quickly. That's why the correct choice emphasizes maintaining adequate traction for control. The other ideas aren't correct because tires don't magically improve braking in all conditions, they aren't primarily about reducing fuel use in adverse weather, and tire condition isn't only important in dry weather—surfaces in rain, snow, or ice demand good tire traction even more.

8. Which option best describes a Policy in organizational governance?

In organizational governance, a policy is a formal document that sets standards for operations and guides how the organization conducts itself. It defines what must be done, who is responsible, and the overarching rules that shape decisions and behavior, ensuring actions align with strategic goals and regulatory requirements. Policies are approved by leadership, communicated to staff, and enforced, providing a consistent framework for accountability and risk management. This differs from a procedure, which explains the exact steps to carry out a task; from a collection of best practices, which are recommended approaches rather than binding rules; and from a law, which is an external statutory requirement. The policy's role is to establish enduring rules that apply across the organization and give staff a clear standard to follow.

Sirencide is the phenomenon where an EMS vehicle's speed reduces the effectiveness of its own siren's warning. The siren emits sound that travels through the air at the speed of sound, but as the vehicle moves quickly, the expanding front of that sound can't reliably reach oncoming pedestrians or other drivers ahead in time. In practice, once the vehicle reaches speeds around 55 mph, the audible cue from the siren ahead becomes less effective, increasing the chance that people won't hear it early enough. That's why warning emphasis shifts toward eyes-on driving, use of lights, and other cues rather than relying on the siren alone. This term isn't about a device to measure siren levels or a particular siren pattern.

10. What is the correct procedure for reporting a near-miss during a drill?

Reporting a near-miss in a drill should happen promptly with a clear, safety-focused process. The best practice is to stop the drill if needed to secure everyone and the environment, then document exactly what happened, analyze why it occurred to identify root causes, share the lessons learned with all participants, and adjust the training to prevent a real incident in the future. This approach strengthens safety culture, helps pinpoint contributing factors (such as equipment issues, procedure gaps, or human factors), and ensures meaningful changes to training are made. If you were to continue the drill and document later, you'd miss timely learning opportunities and risk repeating the near-miss. Waiting to notify a supervisor only after the drill delays addressing the issue. Ignoring the incident, even if it seems minor, undermines safety and increases the chance of a similar event occurring again.
