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Explanations

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1. In a trauma-informed response to sexual violence, who should be present to support the victim?

- A. Only a nurse

Trauma-informed care in sexual violence responses centers the survivor's safety, autonomy, and informed choices. Having a sexual assault victim advocate present provides essential emotional support and a trusted ally who can help the survivor understand options, explain rights, and navigate medical care, reporting, and available resources. A nurse is crucial for medical assessment and care, but one role can't substitute for advocacy and guidance through the reporting process, legal steps, and resources. Law enforcement involvement may be necessary for investigation, but proceeding without an advocate can increase the risk of re-traumatization or feeling pressured. Choosing no additional support leaves the survivor without the necessary emotional and informational support to make decisions that align with their needs and safety.

In intimate partner violence, the tension-building phase is when the threat of violence rises and the atmosphere becomes charged and unstable. The partner's anger grows, triggers can set off arguments, and the vulnerability of the situation is felt by the person on the receiving end. The woman often senses danger and tries to calm things down or withdraw, and she may blame herself for provoking the outburst. This combination of escalating anger and self-blame is what this description captures most clearly. The other scenarios describe different phases of the cycle. Violence occurring with no warning fits the acute incident phase, where the abuse actually happens. Reconciliation with no further abuse describes the honeymoon phase, when the abuser may apologize or promise it won't happen again. The idea that the woman is free to leave without consequence ignores the controlling and threatening dynamics that typically limit safety and autonomy in these relationships.

This clarity helps ensure that both individuals understand that the activity is desired and agreed to, reducing misinterpretation or pressure. It also accommodates different ways people might express consent—spoken yes, or clear, affirmative non-verbal cues—while signaling that consent is active and mutual. While being free from coercion and feeling enthusiastic are important aspects of healthy consent, the truly safe standard is the explicit, clear indication that both parties want to proceed.

Intimate partner violence during pregnancy raises the likelihood of problems arising during the pregnancy itself. This happens through a combination of physical injury, chronic stress, and behaviors that can worsen health, such as poor nutrition, substance use, and skipping prenatal care. Because of these factors, obstetric complications become more common—things like high blood pressure disorders, bleeding, placental problems, anemia, infections, and preterm labor. All of these are pregnancy-related issues, so the statement that there is an increased risk of pregnancy complications best captures the overall impact. The other options imply either a protective effect or no effect, which isn't supported by the evidence. While IPV can also lead to adverse fetal and birth outcomes (like low birth weight or preterm birth), the key pattern is the elevated risk of complications during the pregnancy itself, which is why this choice is the most accurate.

Sex with a minor is illegal in many places because a person under 18 cannot legally consent to sexual activity. When an adult engages in sex with someone below the age of consent, the act is called statutory rape—the focus is on the age-based lack of legal capacity to consent, not on whether there was coercion or force. This distinguishes it from rape, which centers on non-consent through force or coercion, and from acquaintance rape, which is rape committed by someone the victim knows. Sexual abuse is a broader term that covers various exploitative or harmful sexual acts, often involving a minor, but the specific term for sex between an adult and someone under 18 is statutory rape.

The situation tests how violence risk during pregnancy is influenced by factors in the relationship, not just by life changes themselves. Violence is more reliably driven by the abuser's behavior—patterns of coercive control, threats, intimidation, substance use, or a history of abusive dynamics—than by pregnancy status alone. The options presented (pregnancy, postpartum independence, financial planning) are not themselves consistent predictors or precipitants of violence; they don't inherently escalate abuse. So the choice that indicates no effect reflects the idea that these particular factors, in isolation, aren't reliable triggers for violence. In practice, safety assessment focuses on history of abuse, controlling behaviors, threats, and substance use within the relationship, rather than on pregnancy alone.

Fear for safety is the barrier most commonly reported because the threat of immediate harm or escalation after disclosure is a constant concern for many individuals. People worry that if they reveal abuse, the partner will retaliate, escalate violence, or threaten or harm them or their children. This fear can extend to losing housing, financial support, or custody, making disclosure feel too risky. Because of these safety concerns, silence often feels like the safer option, even when help is available. While immigration status and language barriers can complicate disclosure, they do not explain the prevalence of the safety concern as strongly. No barriers would be inaccurate, since many patients do experience some form of barrier. In practice, creating a private, supportive environment and offering safety planning and resources helps patients feel safer about disclosing when they're ready.

Economic abuse centers on using money and finances to control and power over a partner. It includes restricting access to financial resources, or making the partner account for every bit of money spent, which creates financial dependence and traps the survivor in the relationship. This direct manipulation of finances is the clearest example of economic abuse because it targets a person's ability to be independent or leave due to money. The other options illustrate different forms of coercive control that aren't about finances: forcing someone to stay at home to avoid work is about controlling movement and employment, isolating from friends is social isolation, and threatening to call the police is intimidation. While these are harmful, they don't depict economic control, which is why the controlling of financial resources or requiring accounting for money is the best fit.

Rights for survivors in protective orders, custody, and privacy depend on the laws of the local jurisdiction. There isn't a single universal set of rights across all places, so what protections exist, how protective orders operate, and how custody and confidentiality are handled can vary widely. Protective orders are designed to enhance safety by restricting an abuser's contact. When courts decide custody, they prioritize safety for the survivor and any children, so safety considerations can influence who gains custody or visitation. Privacy and confidentiality rules determine what information can be shared and with whom, balancing the survivor's right to privacy with the need to protect safety and coordinate services. Professionals should explain the available options in the client's jurisdiction—such as pursuing a protective order, arranging custody with safety in mind, and understanding confidentiality boundaries and reporting requirements. They should aim to inform without disclosing information more than necessary, ensuring safety while respecting legal and ethical duties.

Choice and collaboration means giving people control over their care and working with them in planning and decisions. In trauma-informed care, empowering individuals and partnering with them helps counter the disempowerment that can accompany trauma, building trust and a sense of safety. The arrangement that best reflects this principle is one where the person is offered options in their services, asked for their preferences, and actively participates in decisions about their plan. Staff listen, discuss the benefits and trade-offs of choices, and adjust the plan based on the person's input, rather than imposing a single path or using punitive actions. While safety and cultural sensitivity are important parts of trauma-informed care, the essential feature here is shared decision-making and honoring the person's autonomy. Punitive measures undermine trust and are not aligned with this approach.
