1. In 1896, which naming change occurred for the Virginia Tech institution?

- A. College of Technology
- B. Virginia Tech Seminary

In 1896, the institution adopted the name Virginia Polytechnic Institute to reflect its expanded focus beyond a single agricultural and mechanical college into a broader polytechnic curriculum. This shift signaled a move toward a more comprehensive technical and scientific education. The prior name, Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College, was updated to emphasize its broader scope, which is why the correct choice refers to the Virginia Polytechnic Institute name. The other options did not occur as the official change in that year, and the modern branding as Virginia Tech came later.

2. Which term is the nickname for the Regimental Band of the Virginia Tech Corps of Cadets?

- A. Highty-Tighties
- B. 2 Knocks
- C. Rat (Historic Term)
- D. Tour

Highty-Tighties is the nickname for the Regimental Band of the Virginia Tech Corps of Cadets. This name has stood for the marching band that performs at cadet ceremonies, parades, and Hokie football games, reflecting their distinctive sharp marching and uniformed presence. The other terms refer to different VTCC traditions or groups and aren't used as the band's nickname.

3. Which of the following is one of the eight values represented by the Pylons?

- A. Courage
- B. Freedom
- C. Ut Prosim
- D. Equality

The Pylons display eight guiding values that shape how cadets live and serve. Ut Prosim, Latin for "That I May Serve," embodies the commitment to selfless service to others—faculty, classmates, the university, and the broader community. Because this phrase is explicitly listed as one of the eight values represented by the Pylons, it is the correct choice. While concepts like courage or equality are important in many contexts, the Pylon attributions in this setting include Ut Prosim as the service-minded value that pairs with the Corps' mission.

4. Which pair conceived and led the creation of the Skipper cannon?

- A. Ensign Sarah J. Mitchell
- B. Brig. Gen. Dwayne Edwards

This item tests leadership and initiative in how a cadet project is started and brought to life. Alton 'Butch' Harper Jr. and Homer 'Sonny' Hickam conceived the Skipper cannon and took on the leadership to guide it from idea to finished piece. They would have identified the goal, mapped out a plan, organized teammates, secured materials, and supervised design, construction, and testing. This combination shows the ability to translate a concept into a tangible training asset, with clear direction and accountability from the outset. The other names or items listed aren't connected to this project, so they don't fit the scenario.

5. What does five knocks indicate in cadet room etiquette?

- A. An upperclassman desiring to enter a new cadet's room.
- B. A bud desiring to enter a senior's room.
- C. A visitor desiring to enter a cadet's room.
- D. A new cadet desiring to enter a bud's room.**

In cadet room etiquette, how you knock conveys who you are and what you want to do. Five knocks is the signal used by a new cadet who wants to enter the room of a buddy. This tells the person inside that the visitor is new and is seeking out a fellow cadet to connect with, so they can respond warmly and grant entry or guide them accordingly. The other options describe different relationships (an upperclassman, a bud visiting a senior, or a random visitor), which aren't indicated by the five-knock pattern, so they don't fit this specific cue.

6. What does the Flaming Grenade on the Corps Crest symbolize?

- A. Courage in training
- B. Preparation for war**
- C. Victory in battle
- D. Peaceful service

The symbol on the Corps Crest uses a flaming grenade to convey readiness for future conflict. Historically, grenadiers and flame imagery denote purposeful preparation for battle—the idea that training is aimed at being prepared to face war if it comes. In this context, the flame serves as a constant reminder to cadets that their drills, discipline, and studies are geared toward being ready to defend and lead when needed. This isn't about courage in training alone, which can be signified by other symbols associated with steadfastness or bravery. It also isn't about victory in battle, which would typically be shown by symbols of triumph, nor about peaceful service, which would be represented by symbols of peace. The emphasis here is the state of readiness and preparation for war, hence the correct meaning is preparation for war.

7. Which motto means "I will fear no evil"?

- A. Non Timebo Mala**
- B. Primus Inter Pares
- C. Forge the Future
- D. Ne Te Molesti Deprimant

This is about recognizing a motto that conveys fearlessness by studying the meaning of the Latin words. Non Timebo Mala breaks down as not + I will fear + evils. Put together, it means I shall fear no evils, or I will fear no evil. It directly expresses a stance of courage and readiness to face danger or trouble, which is exactly what the prompt asks for. The other options don't capture that same idea. Primus Inter Pares means "First among equals," a leadership or pecking-order idea, not about fear. Forge the Future is an English phrase urging action to shape what lies ahead, not a Latin statement about fear. Ne Te Molesti Deprimant translates roughly to "Do not let them trouble/depress you," which is about avoiding harassment or discouragement, not declaring fearlessness toward evil.

8. What symbol on the Corps Crest represents a presidential citation awarded for Spanish-American War service?

- A. Olive Branch
- B. Torch of Knowledge
- C. Laurel Wreath**
- D. Shield of Honor

On military insignia, the laurel wreath is a traditional sign of honor and achievement conferred by a high authority, including presidential recognition. On the Corps Crest, that wreath denotes the presidential citation awarded for service in the Spanish-American War. The other symbols represent different ideas—peace (olive branch), knowledge (torch), and honor (shield)—so the emblem signaling the presidential citation is the laurel wreath.

9. NOT one of the eight values represented by the Pylons?

- A. Ut Prosim
- B. Integrity**
- C. Brotherhood
- D. Duty

The Pylons symbolize eight cadet values that guide how students in the Virginia Tech Corps of Cadets conduct themselves. Ut Prosim, the Latin phrase meaning "That I May Serve," is one of those values and is clearly represented on the Pylons. Brotherhood reflects the strong sense of camaraderie and mutual support among cadets, and Duty emphasizes responsibility to duties, standards, and teammates; both are also included on the Pylons. Integrity, while essential in military life, is not listed among the Pylon values, so it is not represented by the Pylons.

10. Which Class of 1907 Marine is famous for the phrase 'Retreat, hell no!' in WWI?

A. MAJ Lloyd Williams

B. Henry Dekker

C. J.W.G. Stephens

D. Rolfe Robertson

A leader who embodies steadfast resolve in the face of pressure is being highlighted, specifically a Marine officer from the Class of 1907 known for a legendary line spoken during WWI. Major Lloyd W. Williams is the name most widely linked to this moment at Belleau Wood in 1918, when his unit was pressed to retreat. He reportedly answered that retreat was not an option and that they had "just got here," a reply that captured the Marines' fierce tenacity and willingness to stand their ground. This association with a decisive, no-retreat stance makes Williams the best fit for the quote. The other individuals listed do not have this famous line attached to them, so Williams stands out as the one connected to this memorable moment.
