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Explanations

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1. Which president urged American banks and businesses to invest in Latin America to protect and increase US investments abroad?

The correct choice is William Howard Taft. During his presidency, Taft promoted a foreign policy known as "Dollar Diplomacy." This approach aimed to encourage American financial investment in Latin America and East Asia as a means to secure economic interests and promote stability in those regions. Taft believed that by increasing American investments abroad, particularly in Latin America, the United States could protect its economic interests and prevent European influence in the region. This policy marked a significant shift towards incorporating economic power into U.S. foreign relations, contrasting with earlier policies that relied more on direct military intervention or diplomatic efforts without a strong economic component. Other presidents mentioned, while influential in their own rights, had different focuses and policies. Roosevelt, on the other hand, is noted for his Good Neighbor Policy, which sought to improve relations with Latin American countries but did not emphasize investment in the same manner as Taft's Dollar Diplomacy.

Additionally, the compromise established a geographical boundary at latitude 36°30' where slavery would be prohibited in the northern part of the Louisiana Territory. This helped to temporarily ease tensions between the North and South over the issue of slavery, highlighting the importance of legislative compromises in managing the growing sectional divides prior to the Civil War. In contrast, the Kansas-Nebraska Act, passed in 1854, introduced the controversial idea of popular sovereignty, allowing settlers in those territories to determine whether they would allow slavery, which ultimately led to violent conflicts known as "Bleeding Kansas." The Compromise of 1850 sought to address similar issues but involved a series of laws rather than a single framework like the Missouri Compromise, and the Expatriation Act dealt with the issue of citizenship rather than balancing slave and free states.
