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## **Explanations**

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## 1. Which of the following actions is NOT allowed during net play?

- A. Blocking a served ball**
- B. Recovering a ball hit into the net
- C. Contacting the ball on the opponent's side of the net
- D. A ball contacting the net and crossing over

*Blocking a served ball is not allowed during net play because the primary purpose of blocking is to prevent an attack from the opposing team, generally occurring during regular rally play after a serve. The rules specify that any player may not attempt to block a serve, as this is considered a violation. Blocking is designed to counter attacks, not to interfere with a serve, which is a more controlled action that transitions into the rally phase of the game. In contrast, recovering a ball hit into the net is permitted if the ball rebounds off the net and stays in play. This is part of normal play where players can attempt to keep the rally going. Contacting the ball on the opponent's side of the net is also allowed as long as it does not involve any form of interference or violation of the net rules. Additionally, a ball may contact the net and cross over to the other side, which is entirely permissible. The rules allow for these actions because they maintain the flow of the game and allow for strategic responses to plays.*

Finally, exiting the playing area with the First Referee is part of the closing protocol, ensuring that both officials leave together, maintaining professionalism and signaling the conclusion of the officiating duties. Each of these tasks contributes to a smooth and clear end-of-match process, making the final choice, which encompasses all these responsibilities, the most appropriate.*

**5. After the First Referee signals to serve, a re-serve occurs in all cases except when the server:**

*When a re-serve is called, it typically occurs due to an error in the serving process that requires the server to have another opportunity to serve. In the case where the server swings and misses the tossed ball, it results in a re-serve, as this is considered an incomplete action. However, if the server swings, misses, and the ball inadvertently contacts their shoulder, this is classified differently. The contact with the shoulder means that the serve has been executed, albeit unsuccessfully, rather than just being a failed attempt without any contact. Thus, a re-serve is not granted in this situation since the server has technically made an attempt by engaging with the ball, regardless of the fact that it did not travel over the net. Each of the other options presents scenarios that either do not involve an attempt to serve or involve conditions leading to no consequence for the serving attempt, thereby justifying a re-serve. For instance, allowing the tossed ball to drop or catching a bad toss indicates the server did not initiate an attempt at serving and would typically lead to a re-serve being granted.*

**6. How is the signal for an unnecessary delay indicated by the referee?**

*The signal for an unnecessary delay is indeed indicated by the referee with an arm bent across the chest while holding a card. This practice aligns with officiating standards that emphasize clarity and consistency in signaling various infractions and stoppages within the game.*

*In volleyball, the role of the libero is distinct and comes with specific regulations concerning their identification on the roster. Having only one number also simplifies the tracking of individual player statistics, fouls, and rotations for each match. The rules set by governing bodies like the FIVB (Fédération Internationale de Volleyball) emphasize the importance of a single number for the libero to maintain clarity and standardization in officiating. Players in other positions may have more flexibility regarding roster listings, but the libero's unique role necessitates a distinct identification system that prohibits the use of multiple numbers on the roster. Therefore, the correct understanding is that a libero can only have one number listed for official purposes.*

*The libero cannot play in the front row as per the rules established by the sport of volleyball. Hence, focusing on signaling illegal plays made by back-row players aligns with the established role and responsibilities designated for line judges during a volleyball match. This specificity reinforces the understanding of each official's duties on the court.*

*The second referee is responsible for releasing the players in the substitution zone during an exchange. The head coach does not directly release players; their role is more focused on strategy and decision-making regarding substitutions. The first referee oversees the overall match, including monitoring the conduct of the game and enforcing rules but does not handle the substitution process directly. The team captain, while they may have some influence on substitutions, does not have the authority to release players for substitutions in the official capacity required by the game's regulations.*
