Because of these risks, their application is limited to individuals who have undergone the necessary training and certification to handle and apply them safely. This ensures that they are used in accordance with the law, and that proper safety measures are followed, minimizing the ecological and health-related impacts of their use. In contrast, options suggesting that these pesticides are freely available or have no restrictions misunderstand the regulatory intent behind the classification of restricted use pesticides. Additionally, while some pesticides may be banned altogether, restricted use pesticides are not forbidden for use; rather, they require certification to ensure that only those who are trained are applying them.

10. What are dealers required to provide to applicators upon request?

Dealers are required to provide Material Safety Data Sheets (MSDS) to applicators upon request. Option C, usage instructions, are important for applicators to know to ensure safe and effective use of the product, but they are not required to be provided upon request.
