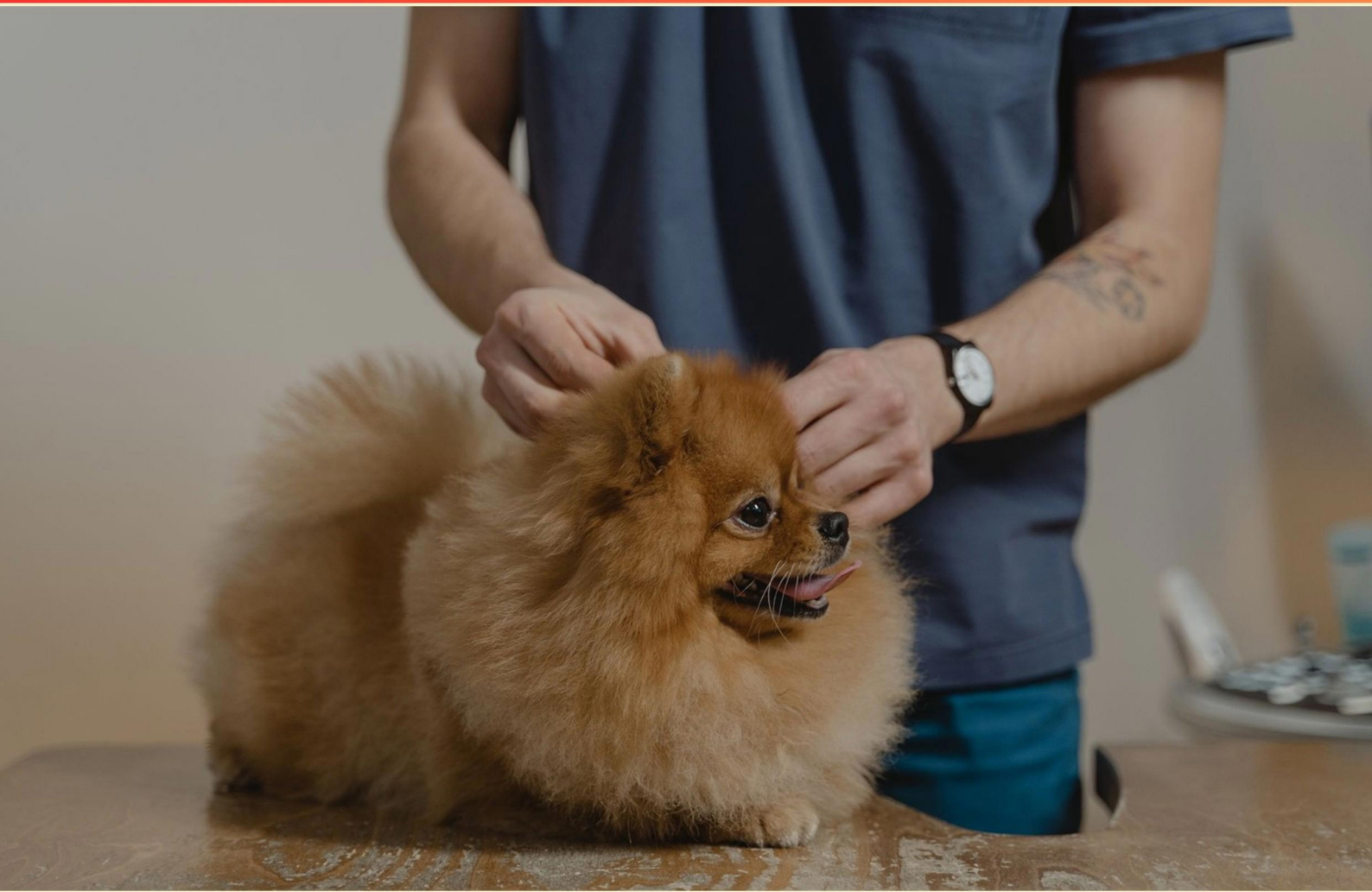

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Explanations

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1. Vetmedin (pimobendan) is classified as which category?

- A. Cardiac medication**
- B. Ear cleaner (non prescription)
- C. Ear cleaner (prescription)

Pimobendan is a cardiac medication because it is used to treat heart disease, specifically congestive heart failure, in dogs. It strengthens the heart's contractions and helps relax and widen blood vessels, which improves cardiac output and reduces the heart's workload. This effect is focused on the cardiovascular system, not the ears or stomach, so it belongs in the cardiac medication category. It's typically prescribed by a veterinarian.

2. What must be done before a newly labeled medication is given to a client?

- A. The clerk hands it to the client
- B. The supervising or dispensing veterinarian must check it**

The key safety step is the final verification by a veterinarian responsible for dispensing. This check ensures the correct drug, strength, dose, directions, and patient information are all accurate on the label before the medication goes home with the client. It also gives a chance to confirm the chosen medication is appropriate for the animal, consider possible drug interactions or allergies, and ensure the label matches the prescription. While staff may prepare and label the medication and the system may track inventory or the client may sign a release in some settings, none of these substitute for the veterinarian's mandatory review. This vet check is the critical safeguard to prevent dosing errors and ensure safe, appropriate care.

Counting tablets and capsules requires a clean, stable surface that makes counting accurate and easy to verify. A counting tray provides just that: a designated, flat area to group pills, count them precisely, and minimize the chance of dropping or mixing them with other medications. Using fingers can lead to miscounts and contamination, while a scale measures weight rather than quantity (unless a specialized counting scale is used, which isn't the standard method here). A ruler measures length, not the number of pills. Therefore, the counting tray is the appropriate tool for ensuring an accurate and safe count.

4. Which abbreviation indicates dosing for the left eye only?

Dosing abbreviations for the eyes are based on Latin terms. *Oculus dexter (OD)* is the right eye, and *oculus sinister (OS)* is the left eye. *Oculus uterque (OU)* means both eyes. Since the instruction is for the left eye only, the correct shorthand is OS. It's the standard way to indicate treatment or dosing to the left eye. AU isn't the typical ophthalmic shorthand for a single eye and isn't used to specify left-eye dosing in most eye medication records.

5. Sucralfate is categorized as which type of product?

Sucralfate is categorized as a gastric protectant because its main job is to shield the stomach lining and help ulcers or irritated mucosa heal. When it's in the stomach, it forms a sticky, protective barrier that adheres to ulcerated or inflamed tissue, protecting it from acid, pepsin, and bile salts. This barrier creates a quiet environment for healing and is the reason it's used for gastric ulcers, gastritis, and related esophageal irritation in animals. It's not a cardiac medication and not an ear cleaner. For best effect, it's usually given on an empty stomach and kept separate from other medicines to avoid interfering with their absorption.

6. Orally means administration by which route?

Orally means administration by mouth and swallowing the medication. When given this way, the drug travels through the digestive system and is absorbed mainly in the small intestine into the bloodstream. This route is convenient and non-invasive, which is why it's commonly used in veterinary care for owner-administered medicines. However, onset can be slower, and some drugs may be degraded by stomach acid or require food to improve absorption. Also, drugs given orally often undergo first-pass metabolism in the liver, which can reduce the amount that reaches systemic circulation. This is different from injections (delivered directly into tissues or the bloodstream), inhalation (through the lungs), or topical application (on the skin or mucous membranes). So, the route described by "orally" is administration by mouth.

7. What does the abbreviation gr stand for in dosage calculations?

Grain is the unit represented by that abbreviation. It comes from the old apothecaries' system and is used for very small masses in some dosing contexts. One grain is about 64.8 milligrams (0.0648 grams), so converting to metric makes it easier to compare with modern prescriptions. The key is recognizing that this label reflects grain, not gram (which would be abbreviated g), not gross (a dozen dozen), and not a standard unit like graham. So when you see that abbreviation, think grain and convert to milligrams or grams as needed, for example 1 gr $\approx$ 65 mg.

8. What is Methyl prednisolone (MPA)?

Methylprednisolone is a corticosteroid, a synthetic glucocorticoid used for its strong anti-inflammatory and immunosuppressive effects. It works by entering cells and changing gene expression to decrease the production of inflammatory mediators like cytokines and enzymes (for example COX-2), helping to reduce swelling, redness, and immune activity. This makes it helpful for allergic reactions, inflammatory or autoimmune conditions, and other situations where dampening the immune response is beneficial. It is not an NSAID, antibiotic, or antifungal, which operate by different mechanisms.

9. Fluconazole is best described as which type of medication?

- A. Appetite stimulant

Fluconazole is best described as an antifungal medication. It's part of the azole class that works by blocking a fungal enzyme needed to make ergosterol, an essential component of the fungal cell membrane. Without ergosterol, the membrane becomes leaky and the fungus can't grow properly, which helps clear infections caused by yeasts like Candida species and Cryptococcus. This mechanism and use distinguish it from other types of drugs: it isn't an appetite stimulant, anti-inflammatory, or antihistamine, which have very different purposes and actions. In veterinary practice, fluconazole is chosen for systemic yeast infections due to its effectiveness and good oral availability.

10. Indirect supervision requires which of the following?

Indirect supervision means the veterinarian has already examined the animal and provided specific instructions for treatment, either in writing or orally, and the clerk carries out the care under those directions without the vet being on-site. This setup ensures there is a professional assessment behind the treatment plan and clear guidance to follow, even when the supervising doctor isn't physically present. If the animal hasn't been examined or there are no instructions from the veterinarian, there's no approved plan to act on. Being on-site would constitute direct supervision, and treating without any instruction would lack proper veterinary direction.
