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Explanations

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1. What does Amendment Twenty-six (26) do?

- A. Lowers the voting age to 18 years old.
- B. Increases the term length of Congress.
- C. Establishes income tax.
- D. Abolishes poll taxes.

The key idea tested is how voting eligibility can change with age. The 26th Amendment says that citizens who are 18 years old or older cannot be denied the right to vote or have it abridged because of their age. In other words, it lowers the minimum voting age to 18 nationwide. This change was adopted in 1971, partly in response to the idea that if 18-year-olds can be drafted for military service, they should also be able to vote. The other options refer to different constitutional changes: one is about how long members of Congress can serve, another about establishing an income tax, and another about banning poll taxes. Those are not what the 26th Amendment addresses.

Patriots are the Americans (colonists) who supported independence from Great Britain and took up the fight to win that independence. They believed the colonies should govern themselves and reject laws and taxes imposed by Britain without colonial consent, so they joined or supported the Continental Army and local militias to oppose British rule. That's why this choice fits best: it describes the people who fought for and backed the push for independence. The other groups aren't patriots in this sense: British soldiers fought for Britain, Loyalists were colonists who remained loyal to the Crown, and Parliament members were part of the British government rather than the colonial independence movement.

3. Which house of Congress is based on state equality?

The key idea here is how representation works in Congress. One chamber gives every state the same voice, regardless of how many people live there. That chamber is the Senate, where each state has two senators no matter its size, so small states and large states have equal influence there. In contrast, the other chamber bases representation on population—more people means more representatives—so larger states have a bigger voice in that house. The President isn't a member of Congress, and the Supreme Court is part of the judicial branch, not a legislative chamber. So the chamber that is based on state equality is the Senate.

4. What is the total number of members in the House of Representatives?

The House has a fixed number of voting members: 435. This total was set by law and has stayed the same since 1929, with seats redistributed among the states after each census to reflect population shifts. Each state must have at least one representative, and the number a state gets can change over time as populations grow or shrink, but the overall count of voting members remains 435. There are also non-voting delegates from places like the District of Columbia and several U.S. territories who can participate in debates and committees but cannot vote on final passage. So, the standard total for the House is 435 voting members.

Congress is the legislative branch of the United States government and is made up of two chambers. Those two bodies are the Senate and the House of Representatives. The Senate has two members from each state, while the House's representation is based on the state's population. The President leads the executive branch, the Supreme Court is part of the judicial branch, and the Cabinet serves as the President's advisory group, not part of Congress. So the two bodies that comprise Congress are the Senate and the House of Representatives.

6. What does the due process clause signify?

Due process means the government must treat people fairly in legal proceedings. It protects you from being deprived of life, liberty, or property without fair procedures—like proper notice, a chance to present your side, and an impartial decision-maker. This idea is built into both the Fifth and Fourteenth Amendments, applying to actions by the federal government and by the states. It covers fair procedures (procedural due process) and, in some cases, the protection of certain fundamental rights (substantive due process). The other rights mentioned are important, but they are specific protections under particular amendments. A speedy trial is a stand-alone right under the Sixth Amendment, unreasonable searches fall under the Fourth Amendment, and cruel and unusual punishment is the Eighth Amendment. The fulfilling concept here is the broad guarantee of fair treatment through the normal judicial process.

Laws are made by the legislative branch. Congress, with its two houses—the Senate and the House of Representatives—drafts, debates, and votes on bills. After both houses approve, the bill goes to the President to sign into law or veto. If vetoed, Congress can override with a two thirds vote in both houses. The President enforces laws, and the courts interpret them. There isn't a separate Administrative Branch in the Constitution, though executive agencies help administer laws. So the legislative branch is the one that makes laws.

Powers not delegated to the federal government are reserved to the states or the people. That idea is written directly in the Tenth Amendment, which says that any powers not given to the United States by the Constitution, and not prohibited to the states, belong to the states or to the people. This is the constitutional rule that keeps the federal government from having unlimited authority. The First Amendment focuses on protecting specific freedoms like religion and speech. The Fourth Amendment guards against unreasonable searches and seizures. The Ninth Amendment notes that people retain rights beyond those listed in the Constitution. While these have important roles, the statement about limiting federal power most clearly and directly comes from the Tenth Amendment.

The main idea is understanding how due process and equal protection are guaranteed to all people, not just by the federal government but also by state governments. The Fourteenth Amendment does this by including a Due Process Clause and an Equal Protection Clause that apply to state actions. This means states must treat people fairly and cannot deny life, liberty, or property without fair procedures, and they must treat similarly situated individuals alike. That combination—due process plus equal protection applied to every citizen at the state level—is what makes this amendment the right answer. The First Amendment protects freedoms like speech and religion, the Fifth Amendment covers due process at the federal level and other rights, and the Eighth Amendment limits cruel punishment and excessive fines or bail. But when the goal is due process and equal protection for all citizens, the Fourteenth Amendment is the one that directly provides that broad, state-level guarantee.

An official agreement between two or more governments or rulers is called a treaty. Treaties are formal, written agreements negotiated by representatives of the parties and spell out promises on things like peace, trade, borders, or alliances. This is different from a constitution, which is the fundamental law of a country that organizes its own government and protects citizens' rights; it isn't an agreement between different governments. A decree is an authoritative order issued by a ruler or government to do something, not a mutual pact. An ordinance is a local law created by a city or town government to regulate local matters.
