Asthma can lead to frequent absences from school or physical limitations during activities, while epilepsy can cause seizures that affect a child's ability to participate in class fully. These conditions are not primarily rooted in cognitive challenges or physical disabilities, which helps to clarify why this grouping is distinct within the educational framework. In contrast, dyslexia primarily involves specific learning disabilities related to reading and language processing.
