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Explanations

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1.Cuál es la acción final descrita en MDMP para pasar de la planificación a la preparación?

- A. Emitir la orden
- B. Completar el plan
- C. Pasar de la planificación a la preparación**

La idea central es la transición entre planear y preparar. En MDMP, se alcanza el punto en que la planificación concluye y debe iniciarse la acción, es decir, la preparación de las fuerzas para ejecutar. Esa transición se describe como pasar de la planificación a la preparación, porque marca el momento en que la intención se transforma en acciones concretas y la orden se difunde para que las unidades empiecen a prepararse. Emitir la orden es una forma de materializar esa transición, pero lo que está siendo descrito como la acción final es precisamente ese paso de pasar de planificar a prepararse. Completar el plan se da antes, y garantizar la comprensión es importante durante todo el proceso, no la transición en sí.

En las operaciones ofensivas, se buscan acciones planificadas para ejercer presión, golpear al adversario y destruir su capacidad. Entre estas se cuentan movimientos destinados a contactar al enemigo para obligarlo a luchar, un ataque directo para romper su posición, y la persecución para desbaratar al enemigo tras la derrota inicial y mantener el impulso. Una emboscada es una acción de combate sorpresiva llevada desde una posición oculta, diseñada para infligir daño o interrumpir la acción enemiga de manera puntual. No se estructura como una operación ofensiva típica en estas categorías, sino como una táctica táctica destinada a aprovechar el terreno y la sorpresa. Por eso, no se considera un tipo de operación ofensiva en esta taxonomía: sirve como medio táctico dentro de la lucha, no como una operación ofensiva independiente como movimiento hacia el contacto, ataque o persecución.

Señales implica las comunicaciones, redes y procedimientos de transmisión. En la estructura de anexos utilizada en este curso, la función de comunicaciones y señales está asignada al Anexo H. Por eso, la opción que corresponde a Anexo H es la mejor coincidencia para Señales. Las demás anexos cubren otras áreas funcionales y no encajarían con Señales.

La idea clave es identificar qué rasgos caracterizan una defensa dentro del marco IFMCOPS. En una postura defensiva se busca frenar al adversario, desorganizar su tempo y adaptarse a la situación para mantener la posición y generar oportunidades a futuro. Interrupción/Desorganizar, Maniobra y Flexibilidad encajan con esa mentalidad: interrumpir el avance enemigo para romper su cohesión, usar el terreno y reposicionarse para ganar ventajas defensivas, y ajustarse rápidamente a cambios en la situación. Movilidad describe la capacidad de trasladar fuerzas con rapidez, lo cual es una habilidad valiosa para muchas operaciones, pero no se identifica como una característica defensiva clave en este marco. Por eso es la opción que no corresponde como rasgo defensivo.

La generación de COAs es la actividad de crear varias opciones para cumplir la misión. En este paso del TLP se esbozan diferentes Courses of Action, describiendo qué acciones concretas se emprenderían, cómo se organizarían las fuerzas y qué recursos se usarían. Esta variedad permite después someter cada COA a análisis, simulación y comparación para decidir cuál es la opción más factible y de menor riesgo. Analizar la misión corresponde a entender qué se debe lograr y suele hacerse antes de generar opciones; analizar un COA o comparar y seleccionar COAs son etapas posteriores, ya que requieren haber desarrollado primero las posibles acciones.

Understanding how to execute operations in the field is tested here. A Field Manual provides the standard, authoritative instructions for conducting operations, including tactics, movements, and the procedures units follow in combat and training. This broad, field-wide guidance makes it the best source for covering both how to act tactically and the procedures to follow. SOPs are more about organization-specific routines, not general tactics; Army Doctrine Publications lay out overarching concepts rather than detailed procedures; Army Techniques Publications focus on specific techniques and tasks, which is narrower than the comprehensive field guidance found in a Field Manual.

The main idea is that time is allocated to each major planning step, and the most time-intensive step is the one that defines the mission's purpose and constraints. In this breakdown, mission analysis receives 30%, making it the largest share. This reflects how understanding the mission intent, constraints, and environment sets the foundation for all subsequent planning activities. A solid mission analysis ensures that later steps—developing courses of action, analyzing and comparing them, and making a decision—are grounded in a clear, shared understanding of what must be accomplished. The other steps fit smaller portions for practical reasons: receiving the mission is a brief intake, developing COA involves generating possible actions, and analyzing/comparing/deciding COA focuses on evaluating those options. Their allocations are substantial but not as large as the deep, initial analysis of the mission itself.

Binding judgments within the Inter-American system come from the Inter-American Court of Human Rights. When a state accepts the Court's jurisdiction, its rulings are final and binding, and the state must comply and provide remedies or reparations as required. The Inter-American Commission on Human Rights handles petitions, investigations, and non-binding recommendations, and it can refer cases to the Court, but its decisions aren't binding in the same enforceable way. The other entities listed aren't part of this system's judicial mechanism: the IACHR is the commission, while the ICRC and UNHRC operate outside the Inter-American framework.

Military necessity is the idea that force may be used only to achieve a legitimate military objective and only to the extent that it is needed to reach that objective. In LOAC, a legitimate objective is something whose attack or destruction contributes meaningfully to defeating the enemy or constraining their ability to wage war. Because of this, the amount and kind of force used must be necessary for that objective and must be proportional to it, so the expected military advantage justifies the harm caused and collateral damage is minimized. This principle works alongside distinction, requiring attacks to target only military objectives, and proportionality, ensuring harm to civilians and civilian objects is not excessive relative to the anticipated military gain. It does not endorse non-lethal-only limits, indiscriminate or unlimited violence, or surrender as a general rule.

La idea principal es identificar la posición de combate que sirve como base para operar. La posición primaria es la ubicación principal desde la que se planea y ejecuta la acción, elegida por ofrecer la mejor combinación de cobertura, campo de tiro, observación y puentes de comunicación y logística. Es la base de la maniobra: desde ella se orientan los movimientos, la defensa y la coordinación con otras unidades. Si esa posición se ve comprometida o no es viable, se recurre a la posición alterna para un repliegue o replanteo rápido; la suplementaria aporta apoyo adicional para la seguridad o la cobertura de sectores específicos; y la subsiguiente puede utilizarse como siguiente paso si la operación continúa. Por eso, es la opción que designa la posición principal.
