SAMPLE

1. Which statement about walkers is true?

- A. To increase speed
- B. To replace physical therapy
- C. To improve balance**
- D. To reduce independence

Walkers provide stability by widening the base of support and giving the arms something to hold onto, which helps you maintain balance while moving. This stability makes it safer to practice weight shifting and stepping, reducing the risk of falls. It's not about speed—using a walker tends to slow you down to promote control—nor is it a replacement for physical therapy, which offers targeted gait training and exercises. A walker can actually support independence by enabling safe, mobile movement, rather than reducing it.

2. Which structure receives electrical impulses from the bundle of His?

- A. Artifact
- B. Bundle branches**
- C. Baseline
- D. Amplifier

The impulse travels from the AV node into the bundle of His, which then splits into the right and left bundle branches. Those bundle branches receive the impulse from the bundle of His and carry it down the interventricular septum to the Purkinje fibers, which distribute the signal to the ventricular muscle for coordinated contraction. Terms like artifact, baseline, and amplifier relate to ECG measurement or equipment, not to cardiac conduction pathways, so they don't describe structures that carry the impulse.

3. Which term describes a collapsed lung?

- A. Bronchitis
- B. Asthma

This question tests your understanding of terms used for lung tissue that has collapsed. Atelectasis is the medical term for the collapse of all or part of a lung, or of the tiny air sacs (alveoli), which leads to reduced or absent air exchange in that area. It can occur when an airway is blocked or when external pressure causes the lung to deflate. That makes it the best description for a collapsed lung. Bronchitis refers to inflammation of the bronchial tubes, causing coughing and mucus. Asthma is characterized by reversible narrowing of the airways with wheezing. COPD describes a chronic, progressive limitation of airflow. None of these describe a collapse of lung tissue the way atelectasis does.

4. Which system comprises Skeletal Muscle, Smooth Muscle, and Cardiac Muscle?

The muscular system is made up of three muscle tissue types—skeletal, smooth, and cardiac—all working together to create movement, support, and regulate bodily functions. Skeletal muscle attaches to bones and enables voluntary movements; smooth muscle lines hollow organs and blood vessels to control involuntary actions; cardiac muscle forms the heart and drives circulation. The option that lists all three muscle types is identifying the muscular system, which is why it's the best choice. The other options point to different systems or structures: nerves relate to the nervous system, blood vessels to the circulatory system, and ligaments to connective tissue.

5. What term describes using non-pathogenic spores on paper strips to monitor sterilization processes?

- A. Spore testing**
- B. Biologic monitoring
- C. Chemical indicator testing
- D. Visual inspection

*The idea here is verifying that a sterilization cycle actually achieves the required level of microbial kill by using biological indicators. Spore testing uses non-pathogenic spores placed on paper strips to challenge the sterilizer; if the spores are killed, it indicates the cycle reached the necessary lethality for that load. After exposure, the strips are incubated to see if the spores germinate—growth means the process didn't achieve sterilization for that run, while no growth confirms effective sterilization. Different spores are chosen based on the sterilization method (for steam, *Bacillus stearothermophilus* is common; for ethylene oxide, *Bacillus atrophaeus*). This approach goes beyond what chemical indicators or visual checks can do, because it directly tests whether the sterilization process can destroy hardy spores, not just whether the equipment reached a certain temperature or the packaging looks correct.*

6. Sanitization is defined as lowering microbial counts on eating utensils and is the lowest level of cleaning.

Sanitization means reducing the number of microorganisms on eating utensils to safe levels, rather than trying to remove every microbe. It's the lowest level of cleaning because the goal is to lower counts to public-health standards, not to achieve complete elimination. In contrast, disinfection aims to kill most pathogens on a surface, and sterilization destroys all forms of microbial life, including spores. A written consent form is not a cleaning concept at all, so it isn't relevant here.

7. Which of the following is NOT a principle of asepsis?

- A. Sterilization
- B. Antisepsis**
- C. Disinfection
- D. Sanitization

The idea here is understanding how asepsis is maintained by methods that reduce or remove microorganisms from environments, instruments, and surfaces, versus those used on living tissue. Sterilization achieves a completely sterile state by destroying all forms of microbial life, including spores, on instruments or in equipment. Disinfection lowers or eliminates most pathogens on inanimate surfaces, though it may not kill all spores. Sanitization reduces microbial counts to safe levels for general cleanliness. Antisepsis, on the other hand, involves applying chemical agents to living tissue to prevent infection by inhibiting or killing microorganisms. Since antisepsis targets living tissue rather than creating or maintaining a sterile environment, it's not categorized as a principle of asepsis in the context of sterile-field practice.

8. Which program provides Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Veterans Administration coverage?

CHAMPVA, which stands for Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Veterans Administration, is the program that provides this coverage. It covers eligible spouses, dependent children, and survivors of veterans who have total service-connected disabilities or who died from service-connected conditions, and is administered by the Department of Veterans Affairs. It's different from private network plans like PPO or EPO, which are types of private insurance, and from TRICARE, which serves active-duty service members, retirees, and their families. If a veteran's spouse or child qualifies under these VA criteria, CHAMPVA is the coverage they would use.

Abbreviations that are recognized as acceptable in the medical environment are called approved medical abbreviations. These have been vetted and standardized so clinicians can understand notes, orders, and records consistently, reducing chances of miscommunication and medication or treatment errors. Hospital policies and safety guidelines typically define which abbreviations are approved, ensuring that everyone reading a chart knows what those shorthand terms mean. Abbreviations that aren't recognized aren't appropriate for documentation, while those from textbooks or unique to a single facility may not be universally understood, which can create confusion in care or when sharing information with other providers.

10. Which disease is a bacterial skin infection characterized by isolated pustules that crust and rupture?

Impetigo is a bacterial skin infection that presents with isolated pustules that crust and rupture, forming honey-colored crusts over red, irritated skin. It's most common in children and is highly contagious, spreading through direct contact or shared items. The usual culprits are Staphylococcus aureus or Streptococcus pyogenes. You'll often see small vesicles or pustules that quickly rupture, leaving characteristic crusts, typically around the nose and mouth but possible anywhere on exposed skin. Treatment depends on how widespread it is: mild cases may improve with topical antibiotics like mupirocin, while more extensive infections or those not responding to topicals may require oral antibiotics. This differs from ringworm, which is fungal and causes ring-shaped, scaly patches; rosacea, which is chronic facial redness with occasional papules but not crusted pustules; and pediculosis, which involves itching and lice/nits rather than crusted pustules.
